B. Executive Session Minutes

Section 2.06(c) of the Open Meetings Act requires that the Board of Trustees review the minutes of all executive sessions at least semi-annually to determine whether the need for confidentiality still exists as to all or part of those minutes. Minutes of executive sessions, or portions thereof, which no longer require confidential treatment must be made available for public inspection.

In order to comply with this provision, Board Counsel is reviewing executive session minutes and will provide the Board recommendations as to whether or not all or part of those minutes should remain confidential.

C. Sale of Property and Construction Easement for Improvement of Illinois Route 16 (Lincoln Avenue)

In connection with the improvement of Illinois Route 16 (Lincoln Avenue), the State of Illinois, Department of Transportation has asked that the University sell them two parcels of property and provide them with a construction easement for two parcels of property to allow them to improve Illinois Route 16 (Lincoln Avenue) for the sum of \$7,100.00.

The sale affects the following land:

A part of the Southwest Quarter of Section 14, Township 12 North, Range 9 East of the Third Principal Meridian, Coles County, Illinois, described as follows:
