Financial Aid/Tuition and Fees/Economy/Jobs

- At no fault to EIU since minding my financial affairs is my business, [but] I do wish someone had guided me in regards to student loans. I attended an out of state grad program and could have saved myself 20,000 if someone tipped me off to let me know I could have maintained admission status but postponed attendance 1 year. In that year I could've worked in field and earned state residency (now have a very large student loan debt I can not justify supporting EIU until its gone). (354)
