Concentrations for Elementary Education:

Middle School Option

Elementary Education majors pursuing the Middle School Option must select a concentration from the list below. Each concentration requires 18 semester hours, 6 of which must be at the upper division level. Courses used to satisfy other General Education requirements cannot be applied toward the concentration, with the possible exception of the diversity course which may be included in the concentration if appropriate.

Students wishing to receive an endorsement in any area in order to be able to teach in a departmentalized Junior High or Middle School (grades 5-9), must check with their advisors for specific requirements.

English

Eighteen semester hours of course work, six must be at the upper division level. Must include ENG 2901 and an advanced composition course, a course in American Literature, and an upper division course in children's literature such as ENG 3405, 3406 or 4903.

General Science

Eighteen semester hours of course work, six must be at the upper division level. At least two courses from biological science and two from physical science must be represented. Courses must include BIO 1100 and one of the following: BIO 1200G or 1300G. A total program must include both chemistry and physics.

Mathematics

Eighteen semester hours of course work, six must be at the upper division level. At least three of the following areas must be represented: A) calculus; B) modern algebra or number theory; C) geometry; D) computer science; E) probability and statistics; or F) history of mathematics. Methods courses are not acceptable. An algebra course should be included in a student's total program.

Social Science

Eighteen semester hours of course work, six must be at the upper division level. Two disciplines must be represented with a minimum of two courses from each discipline. Courses must include HIS 2010 or 2020, world civilization, a course in non-U.S. history and electives from Economics, Geography, and Political Science.

1. A cultural diversity course from General Education must be included in humanities, social sciences or area of concentration.

2. The senior seminar must be taken outside the field of Education.

3. See University catalog for approved concentrations (also listed to right).

4. Program requires work in both the Biological and Physical Sciences

5. Placement based on student's ACT Math score. Students with ACT scores of 1-16 will take MAT 1020 and MAT 1420 concurrently. Students with scores of 17 and up will enroll directly in MAT 1420.

6. Skills courses are not acceptable. Suggested Art courses are ART 2330G, 2310G, 3340G, 3610G. Suggested Music courses are MUS 2555G, 3553. Suggested Theater Arts courses are THA 2010G, 2012G, 2140G, and 3755G.

7. Students must have completed two years in a single foreign language in high school with a C average or better, or complete the second course at the college level to satisfy this Graduation Requirement.

8. Students should enroll in the methods course that corresponds to their Subject Area: Biological Sciences (ELE 3290), Social Sciences (ELE 3340), Language Arts (ELE 3350), and Mathematics (MAT 3620).

9. Students selecting the Mathematics Subject Area are exempt from MAT 3420.

10. Students may attempt each field experience no more than twice. Refer to the Repeat policy in the Undergraduate Catalog - in the CEPS section under Teacher Certification Programs.

11. Departmental Approval to Student Teach is required by Midterm of the semester preceding the student teaching semester. Check with Department for exact due date each semester. Beginning with Fall 2010 student teaching candidates, all professional education coursework must be completed prior to student teaching

Every student planning to student teach must attend a meeting during the **Fall semester preceding the academic year in which the student plans to student teach** to formally apply for student teaching. Failure to attend a meeting to apply to student teach or failure to complete the application materials by the deadline will result in a minimum of one-year delay in student teaching. Additional information is available in the University catalog.

Students are required to devote an entire semester to student teaching. Students must enroll for the maximum student teaching hours (14). They may not sign up for any courses other than student teaching.
