Dr. Key (PhD, Cornell University, 1989) is a professor in the History Department. His research interests include Early Modern Revolutions, Early Modern Social, Anglo-American Political Culture, Historical Publishing, Historical Writing, Britain, Ireland, Europe, World, Study Abroad. Professor Key is a specialist in early modern British history. He is co-author of *Early Modern England, 1485-1714: A Narrative History and Sources and Debates in English History, 1485-1714* (both Oxford, forthcoming, 2003). He has published articles on feasts, sermons, and political and religious culture in *English Historical Review*, *Huntington Library Quarterly*, *Journal of British Studies*, and in *The Politics of Religion in Restoration England*, ed. Tim Harris, Paul Seaward, and Mark Goldie (Oxford, 1990), as well as entries for various historical dictionaries, encyclopedias, and the new *Dictionary of National Biography*. He is active in the Midwest and North American Conference on British Studies, and is early modern book review editor for H-Albion. Eastern Illinois University has awarded him a Achievement and Contribution Award in Teaching (1997) and Balanced (Teaching, Research, Service, 2000). Professor Key regularly teaches graduate seminars in Early Modern European Social History, Early Modern European Revolutions, Anglo-American Political Culture before 1800, and Historical Publishing.
