Doudna Fine Arts Center reopens. The Midwest's newest architectural landmark, the Doudna Fine Arts Center, opened in August, giving art, music and theatre students an awe-inspiring facility that will enhance cultural activities for the entire region. The Rededication Celebration, planned for Oct. 24-26, is to include a lecture by the building's designer, internationally renowned architect Antoine Predock. VP for Business Affairs to retire. Jeff Cooley, vice president for business affairs, plans to retire Dec. 31. Cooley is a 1979 EIU graduate and 25-year employee of the institution. "Jeff's retirement will be a huge loss to Eastern's administrative team," said EIU President Bill Perry. "His leadership and knowledge of fiscal matters, of the university and of state offices has been of great benefit to Eastern for many, many years. We will miss Jeff's energy, great sense of humor, expertise, ideas and dedication to the university's best interests."

Eastern again among best in U.S. News & World Report rankings. For the ninth consecutive year, EIU has been named one of the top Midwestern public universities in its class by U.S. News & World Report. EIU is again ranked 14th among all Midwestern public universities offering a full range of undergraduate degrees and some master's degree programs. The numbers show that EIU has retained its focus on personal attention. For example, the student-faculty ratio dropped to 15:1 (from 16:1 the previous year), and only 4 percent of all classes have 50 or more students. In addition, EIU touts the highest freshman retention rate and the highest graduation rate among all Illinois public universities in its class.

\$623,000 grant funds new interactive online nursing classes. Registered nurses now have the opportunity to take interactive online courses to earn bachelor's degrees from EIU, thanks to a three-year, \$623,000 grant from the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services' Health Resources and Services Administration. "This is going to allow us to offer so many more things and allow so many more students to get into the program," said Dianne Nelson, Ph.D., R.N., director of EIU's nursing program, which has begun its second year.

New students participate in Eastern Reads program. When new students arrived on campus this fall, most of them already had a common thread, having read "Mountains Upon Mountains" over the summer as part of Eastern Reads. Events have been held to facilitate discussion, including reading circles led by about 90 volunteers from all facets of campus. The book tells the story of Dr. Paul Farmer, a physician who spent most of his career in Haiti, focusing on tuberculosis and AIDS. "We want to get incoming freshmen to think about their own dreams and what they want to do in the world," said Bonnie Irwin, dean of the Honors College and one of the program's coordinators. Eastern Reads activities will culminate on Oct. 27 with a speech by Joia Mukherjee, who works for Farmer's organization, Partners in Health.

Emergency handbooks have been placed in classrooms and other public places throughout campus as part of EIU's efforts to inform the campus community about procedures to be followed in the event of environmental and public safety hazards. Rare 'corpse plant' draws thousands of visitors. A rare tropical plant, the titan arum, produced its first flower in June, following more than six years of vegetative growth in EIU's Thut Greenhouse. About 3,000 people visited the plant to witness its blooming, according to Steven Malehorn, greenhouse manager, who has tended to the titan arum since it was planted. The titan arum, which produces the largest unbranched inflorescence in the world, is on the World Conservation Union's Red List of Threatened Species. The plant is also sometimes called the corpse flower, as the flowers produce a scent similar to rotting meat.

Eastern Illinois Writing Project hosts Summer Institute. Fourteen area teachers from various disciplines attended the four-week Eastern Illinois Writing Project Summer Institute at Eastern Illinois University in July. The program, "Writing Workshop for Writing Teachers: Facilitating Best Writing from our Students and Ourselves," was the first summer institute for the new Eastern Illinois Writing Project site, which is part of the National Writing Project. The mission of the NWP, according to its Web site, "is to improve student achievement by improving the teaching of writing and improving learning in the nation's schools."

EIU takes over shuttle bus service. In an effort to control costs, the university has opted to operate its own shuttle service with leased buses and university personnel as drivers. "Our goal is excellent stewardship of student fees and cost avoidance in the future," said Dan Nadler, vice president for student affairs. The shuttle bus service began in 2002 through a contract with a local transportation company.

New and improved EIU Web site goes online. In August, Webmaster Ryan Gibson unveiled the new EIU Web site (www.eiu.edu), featuring a fresh new look, added features and greater accessibility. The site is an important communications piece for the university, as it receives more than 3 million hits and 185,000 unique visitors a month. Orchestra receives \$10,000. The Eastern Symphony Orchestra, which blends the best student musicians with professional-quality players from the community, has once again received a \$10,000 grant from the Charleston Charitable Foundation. The foundation's support, which has played a primary role in the growth and development of the ESO through the years, is especially important as activities move into the new Doudna Fine Arts Center, said ESO director Richard Robert Rossi.

MBA student spends summer working on Wall Street. The real-world stock market experience provided by the College of Business' Securities Analysis Center recently helped MBA student Jake Byrne edge out students from UCLA, North Carolina, Cornell and Yale to land a competitive Wall Street internship with Merrill Lynch. Byrne, a former key member of the Panthers basketball team who earned his bachelor's degree in finance with a 3.93 GPA in just three years, says EIU's facilities and its people made the difference in preparing him for the internship. "We're not a huge name, but we have an excellent business program, and I felt really prepared when I walked in my first day," Byrne said.

Students interning as athletic trainers with NFL teams. Six students who have worked in the EIU training room gained additional hands-on experience this summer through athletic training internships with high-profile teams. Three earned internships in the National Football League: Ray Lysinger of Charleston worked with the New Orleans Saints (coached by former EIU quarterback Sean Payton); Eric DePorter of Rockford landed a spot with the St. Louis Rams; and Shawn Ready of Effingham worked with the New England Patriots. Others serving internships were Dan Czajkowski of Edwardsville with the Chicago Fire, a professional men's soccer team; Dani Wessel of Pocahontas with the Chicago Bandits, a professional women's softball team; and Shanna Davis of Charleston with the Disney Wide World of Sports Complex in Florida.

Faculty Laureate promotes the joy of learning. Political science professor Melinda Mueller recalls her 10-year-old daughter stepping off of a school bus and jumping joyously into the air about her day's successes in long division and on an essay she'd written about Martin Luther King Jr. "Since that day," Mueller said, "I've thought about how wonderful it would be if all of us could jump in the air like a fourth-grader over something we've learned during the day." As Eastern's 2008-09 Faculty Laureate -- the university's official spokeswoman on the importance of a general liberal arts education -- Mueller hopes to promote her idea to students of all majors. She delivered the keynote address during Convocation on Sept. 2.

Former EIU soccer player and coach now leads major league team. Schellas Hyndman '73, '77, a player on EIU's 1969 national championship soccer team, was named head coach of Major League Soccer's FC Dallas in June. Hyndman, one of the top college coaches in the country for a quarter-century, coached at EIU from 1977 to 1983, leading the Panthers to two national finals appearances and earning a National Coach of the Year award.

Former student names asteroid for retired professor. Robert Millis '63, director of Lowell Observatory in Flagstaff, Ariz., credits retired EIU physics professor Scott Smith with guiding him to his career in astronomy. So when Millis recently discovered an asteroid, he decided to name it after his mentor and friend. "The influence he had on me sent my life in a completely different direction. Had I not encountered him, I would have never pursued a career in astronomy," Millis told The Daily News of Newburyport (Mass.). Smith spent four decades at Eastern. "I felt very honored by his feeling that I had contributed so much to his life," Smith said.

Former Panther returns as swim coach. Matt Bos '00, '02, a former member of the EIU swim team, has taken the reins from coach Ray Padovan, who retired in May after 42 years as the EIU head coach. Bos brings with him an impressive resume, including working the past three years as the head swim coach for the San Antonio Wave, a top swim club in Texas. He has coached several junior and senior national qualifiers; national record-holder Jimmy Feigen, who recently competed in the 2008 U.S. Olympic Trials; and Annabel Kosten, who went on to earn a bronze medal in the 2004 Athens Summer Olympics. Bos and his wife, Amanda, also a former EIU swimmer, have both served as camp directors for Swim with the Stars, a swim camp owned by Michael Phelps and other Olympians.

EIU basketball legend Duckworth dies at 44. Kevin Duckworth, one of the top players in the history of Eastern's basketball program before becoming a two-time NBA All-Star, died Aug. 25 at the age of 44. Duckworth, who spent most of his 12 NBA seasons as the Portland Trail Blazers' center, made an indelible mark on EIU athletics. He is EIU's career rebounding leader with 867, and he ranks sixth in career scoring with 1,589 points. Duckworth, who led EIU to the Mid-Continent Conference Tournament Championship in 1985, was the Mid-Continent Conference Player of the Year in 1986. He was inducted into the EIU Hall of Fame in 1993. Eastern's men's basketball team plans to pay tribute to Duckworth this season by wearing an honorary mark on their jerseys.
