Seventy-eight percent of Eastern's student body received some type of financial assistance in FY 2014 in the form of scholarships, grants, loans, tuition waivers and/or employment, from various federal, state, university, and other programs. Financial aid in FY 2014 totaled \$122,282,904 at Eastern, a decrease of (\$4,380,229) or (3%) over FY 2013. The percentage breakdown of financial aid sources is as follows: 62% federal, 10% state, 20% institutional, and 8% other.

AROUND CAMPUS

More than 500 graduates participated in Eastern's Fall 2014 Commencement ceremonies on Saturday, Dec. 20. President Bill Perry both presided and presented the "Charge to the Class" during both ceremonies. Rebecca Throneburg, who was selected as EIU's 2014 Luis Clay Mendez Distinguished Service Award recipient for her contributions to the university, the field of communication disorders and sciences, and the community, was formally recognized. The award honors the memory of Mendez, an EIU professor of Spanish who died in 2003.

EIU commemorates Veterans Day with series of events. Eastern commemorated Veterans Day with a series of events focused on military education including its annual ceremony. Community residents were invited to join students, faculty and staff in Old Main's Cougill Foyer. The annual ceremony included remarks by Derrick Jackson, an EIU student veteran, and EIU President Bill Perry, as well as the laying of a wreath. The ROTC Panther Battalion rendered a three-volley salute, while members of the EIU Department of Music performed the National Anthem and the playing of taps.

Scott Shaffer, coordinator of EIU's military student assistance center, said the ceremony is only a part of EIU's commitment to military veterans. EIU was recognized by U.S. News & World Report for its commitment to military veterans. The magazine's "2015 Best Colleges" rankings, published annually, list Eastern as the No. 13 "Best College for Veterans" among Midwestern regional universities (public and private). EIU was the second highest ranked public university on the list.

Charleston family creates Old Main gingerbread house. Brian Sanders and his children wanted to create something that embodied the "heart" of Charleston. That's why the family created a replica of Eastern Illinois University's Old Main completely out of gingerbread. An international student from Honduras, Flores earned recognition as a Fulbright Scholar. Garoppolo, a second round pick in the 2014 NFL Draft by the Patriots, was able to take a few snaps for the Patriots as they clinched the AFC Championship over

Indianapolis. Garoppolo joins former EIU head coaches Sean Payton and Mike Shanahan, along with player Ted Petersen, as Panthers who will participate in a Super Bowl.

EIU Student-Athletes Make the Grade. Eastern Illinois student-athletes excelled in the classroom during the Fall 2014 semester as they compiled a cumulative 3.13 GPA for the department. Sixteen of EIU's 19 intercollegiate teams posted a team GPA of 3.00 or higher with the top team average a 3.71 by women's golf. EIU had 60 student-athletes with a perfect 4.0 GPA and a total of 267 student-athletes with a 3.0 or higher.

EIU Men's Basketball Sets School Record. Eastern Illinois men's basketball set a school record for consecutive wins at the NCAA Division I level as the Panthers won their ninth straight game on Jan. 17 at Morehead State. The previous EIU Division I record was eight. EIU climbed into the Mid-Major Top 25 poll for the first time since the 2001 season as they were ranked No. 23 in the nation for the week of Jan. 19. The men's game on Jan. 22 was televised nationally on CBS Sports.
