A Little Compassion Goes a Long Way: EIU Professor and Local Business Provide Holiday Meal to International Students

Wafeek Wahby experienced an eye-opening moment when he realized some of his international students had never imbibed in a true American Thanksgiving dinner.

Having once been an international student himself, the EIU technology professor has always reserved a special place in his heart for those students who come to the U.S. from various other parts of the world.

Five years ago, after discovering many of "his" students stayed on campus instead of experiencing the traditional turkey, dressing and pumpkin pie meal of the season, he became determined.

"I always tell my students it is not the equations or formulas they will remember," he said, "It is the people and outside experiences that you will remember 60 years from now as you tell your grandchildren about your years in America."

It was in that moment Wahby made a promise. He promised to offer all EIU international students a holiday dinner, even though he did not have the logistics nailed down. Luckily, local business owner Frank Zendeli and his son, Gici, offered their help.

While searching for discounts on food or donations, Wahby approached the Lincoln Garden restaurant. By then, he had become slightly discouraged. Sitting down with the owner and his son, Wahby shared his story. Without hesitation, the father and son agreed not to provide a discount, but, rather, host the entire dinner at their restaurant — for free.

"He (Frank Zendeli) looked at me, and said, they (the meals) are on me," Wahby remembered. Although filled with relief, he couldn't help but ask again with disbelief.

"They are on me, Dr. Wahby," he stressed to Wahby. "Any number (of students), if you get them here, we will give them a real dinner like Thanksgiving and Christmas."

And five years later, the Zendeli family are still true to their word. Wahby and the Zendeli family offered the annual Thanksgiving/Christmas dinner on Monday, Dec. 14, 2015, for EIU international students and friends. EIU Alumnus Finalist for Global Teacher Prize. An EIU education alumnus, Joe Fatheree, has been selected as a finalist for the Varkey Foundation Global Teacher Prize. The top 50 nominees have been shortlisted from 8,000 nominations and applications from 148 countries around the world. Only eight individuals on the list were from the United States, Fatheree included. The award, considered the Nobel Prize of teaching, will be announced in March 2016.

Fatheree started teaching 30 years ago after graduating from EIU with a bachelor's degree in 1989 and later a master's degree in 2005. As a multimedia instructor in Effingham, Fatheree helped create the popular CEO (Creating Entrepreneurial Opportunities) class that focuses on hands-on learning. The idea for the class came from realizing his students responded better to hands-on learning. The initial class has expanded to 30 cities.

Fatheree was also named Illinois Teacher of the Year in 2007 and was awarded the NEA's National Award for Teaching Excellence in 2009.

EIU Alumnus Selected as Assistant Coach of the Year. EIU alumnus Mick Galeski '08 has been selected as the NSCAA 2015 National Assistant Coach of the Year for Junior Colleges. The award recognizes outstanding assistant coaches. Galeski teaches physical education at Edison Middle School in Champaign and coaches at Parkland College as the assistant coach of men's soccer. But Beth was a full three years behind him and while he waited for her to graduate, fate knocked and Craig took a temporary job that changed the course of their lives.

"It (The job) was temporary, and I didn't figure on falling in love with the kids," said Craig, grinning. "So, I never 'escaped' because of the kids."

In fact, neither Craig nor Beth actually ever wanted to escape. Together, they dug in and began working toward a better way to educate countless students, each in different ways — Beth as a kindergarten teacher and Craig as a band director, and later as a film producer and guide to entrepreneurship. As the Lindvahls, began to dig into their careers, one thing is clear, life for them has always been about their "kids."

EIU Football Returns to FCS Playoffs. Eastern Illinois football made its 16th FCS playoff appearance this season as the Panthers posted a 7-4 regular season record. The 16 FCS playoff appearances rank sixth all-time in the NCAA for FCS playoff appearances. EIU finished the season ranked No. 23 in the FCS Coaches poll and No. 25 in the STATS FCS Media poll. Senior Dino Fanti was named the OVC Defensive Player of the Year and a first team All-American.

Tom Akers Inducted Into Illinois Track Hall of Fame. Long-time Eastern Illinois track and field coach Tom Akers was recently inducted into the Illinois Track Hall of Fame. Akers has been the most successful coach in OVC track history with the Panthers winning a combined 40 indoor and outdoor men's and women's track championships.

EIU men's and women's basketball will have five national television appearances this season during Ohio Valley Conference play, with the men hosting four televised games in Lantz Arena. EIU kicked off the five games on Jan. 14 against Eastern Kentucky on the CBS Sports Network. EIU will host Murray State in late February on CBS Sports Net and the Panthers will host Southeast Missouri and Austin Peay on the American Sports Network.

The EIU women's team will play a televised OVC game on the road at UT Martin, airing on the American Sports Network.

New EIU Panther Logo Mark Wins National Award. The newly designed EIU Athletic Panther logo was ranked No. 2 in the nation for new sports logos by SportsLogos.net, a nationally recognized website that ranks athletic logos. The logo was unveiled in early October after being designed by national firm Collegiate Licensing Company. The logo was among more than 150 logos that were new this year.
