Course Themes: This course surveys the history, institutions, religion, and culture of ancient Persia, focusing on the eras of the Achaemenids, the Arsacids, and the Sasanians. Among the topics we will consider are internal political structures (king and nobility, etc.), the nature and function of Zoroastrianism (also Christianity in the Sasanian realm), historiographical questions concerning Iranian and non-Iranian (mostly Greek and Latin) sources, and relations with the civilizations to the west. Regarding the latter, much of the course will consider the diplomatic, cultural, and military relations between the Persians under the Achaemenids and the Greeks, between the Parthians under the Arsacids and the Romans, and between the Persians under the Sasanians and the later Romans.
