Course Description:

The aim of this course is to introduce the student to the concepts of deviance, deviant behavior and the sanctions associated with these concepts. Specifically, this class will deal with the following issues; alcohol and drug use/abuse, criminal behavior, mental illness, sexuality, and a variety of theoretical explanations of these behaviors.

Course Objectives:

- 1) My primary goal is to equip you with an in-depth understanding of deviant behavior from a sociological perspective.
- 2) The second is to improve your ability to sort out important facts, retain those facts, and be able to apply them appropriately in logical arguments.
- 3) The last goal will be to further develop your analytic skills.

The first goal can be accomplished by regular class attendance and participation. The second and third goals will be accomplished by adequately meeting the class requirements/assignments.
