<u>Course Description & Objectives</u>: You are introduced to a variety of research methods in the social sciences including the use of the library, techniques of observation, and basic steps in quantitative & qualitative analysis. I use lecture, guided discussion and in-class work to enhance your comprehension of the course content. By the end of the course you should be able to:

- 1. understand a variety of qualitative & quantitative social research methods & demonstrate that you understand the strengths & weaknesses of each.
- 2. explain the connection between theory & research & show evidence of this in your writing.
- 3. explain the techniques of collecting, analyzing, & presenting results of research.
- 4. contemplate ethical concerns in scientific research & practice within these guidelines.

Course Guidelines:

- 1. *Collegiality* You are expected to respect the viewpoints expressed by others. If you disagree with what someone has said, you are encouraged to express your disagreement but are expected to do so in a civil, respectful, & polite manner. Failure to comply will result in course dismissal.
- 2. *Attendance/Participation* I record attendance daily. You are expected to attend class daily and participate fully. You will obviously miss critical information if you have excessive absences and this will be reflected in your exam and homework grades. - 7. *Homework* You will complete 12 homework assignments that are either homework from the companion textbook website (Homework 1-7 with links available in the weekly D2L class

folders) or assignments where you will conduct research 'in the field' (Homework 8-12 which are available in the D2L dropbox with full instructions). To reduce our carbon footprint and as a cost savings measure to you, you are required to submit all homework assignments through Desire2Learn "eiu online (d2l)". You will NOT submit printed copies of assignments in class. Since all homework is available well in advance of the due date, late work is simply not accepted. This means you must plan well and plan early to complete the work. All homework is due at 9am! Of course, you can always submit assignments early.

8. *Exams* – You will have three exams that may consist of a combination of multiple choice, short answer & essay questions. You will be required to draw upon your readings, lectures, class discussions, video's, etc. to answer the questions. Exams cannot be made up.
