COURSE DESCRIPTION: To prepare professionals such as family service personnel, educators, and parents to work with individuals and families at various stages in the family cycle in the area of family life and sex education.

COURSE OBJECTIVES:

Upon completion of this course participants should be able to:

- 1. Identify and describe sexual anatomy and physiology, and related health concerns, from a global perspective.
- 2. Explore biological and cognitive factors that influence sexual development.
- 3. Compare and contrast issues related to sexual development at various stages of the lifespan.
- 4. Create materials to introduce sexuality education to a variety of populations (e.g., special needs, young children, adolescents, caregivers, older adults).
- 5. Analyze the role of sexuality education in contemporary society (e.g., impact on sexual health, LGBTQ community, public schools, religious organizations, media, global models, bullying, public policy).
- 6. Differentiate among types of sexuality commonly seen as atypical while identifying issues of public policy, health and safety, legality, media representation and societal support.
- 7. Explain sexual coercion and exploitation and other societal concerns related to sexuality.
- 8. Integrate and explain how various aspects of the discipline (i.e., financial literacy, hospitality management, family services, apparel and textiles, nutrition and dietetics) fit into issues of sexuality.

NOTE: You cannot see all of the material needed to pass this class using only a cell phone. You must have a tablet at the minimum, or plan to go to the library once a day to check your course.

DR. SHERWOOD'S COURSE POLICIES:

• Assignments should have one-inch margins, and need to be double-spaced, and proof-read. Evaluations will be based, in part, on the technical aspects of the work, including grammatical or typographical errors. APA style should be used; there are several

resources on d2I. Assignments MUST be submitted in either ODT (freeware) or WORD or PDF formats, or a 0 will result.

- I use Turnitin in my courses; it is built into d2I so you do not have to submit anything separately. Here is the disclaimer from EIU: "Eastern Illinois University is committed to the learning process and academic integrity that is defined in the Students Conduct Code (1.1). To encourage original and authentic written work, any written assignment created in this course will be submitted for review to Turnitin and will become a searchable document with the Turnitin-protected and restricted database."
 - O Written assignments should not show more than 15% material obtained from another source (excluding references and direct quotes) as per Turnitin's originality reports. The use of originality reports is strongly recommended and are explained within the FAQ's. Assignments should not show more than 25% material obtained from another source when direct quotes are considered. Assignments over 15% originality (25% when considering direct quotes) will be graded based on original material. For example if an assignment worth 100 points contains 40% source material 40% (40 points) will automatically be lost. Loss of points will not occur for 15% or 25%.
- Each of you must read 10 discussion posts. If you do not read your classmates' posts you will not earn credit for the assignment, even if you posted/replied.

Late assignments will be accepted with the loss of 20% of your grade immediately and 10% each week until submitted. Contact me on D2L email if you have any concerns.
