Course Description:

A survey of the law as it relates to professionals in the field of sport and fitness management. Pertinent concepts and legal constraints including liability, negligence, and tort related to employment in various professional positions in the sport industry. This course is restricted to KSS majors

Course Objectives:

- 1. Integrate key legal terms, principles, and concepts applicable to the sport industry.
- 2. Analyze how elements of law apply to administering sport and fitness management.
- 3. Examine common case studies of negligence that occur in the sport-fitness environment.
- 4. Develop risk management guidelines and checklists for sport-fitness environment.
- 5. Analyze case law and apply established legal precedence to recent situations and scenarios.
- 6. Evaluate the use of collective bargaining agreements in professional sports.

In addition students taking this course for graduate credit will:

- 1. Analyze group discussions on legal concepts to navigate particular areas of sport interest and their intersection with the law
- 2. Produce independent research involving an issue relating to sport and the law.

Writing Assignments

Case Analysis

Each student will prepare one case analyses. The case analysis will provide a summary of the case along with a risk management section on how the case could have been prevented. Please submit the analyses through D2L, and either scan the original case in, provide the link, or provide the hard copy to me in class. Further instructions will be provided as the semester progresses.

Graduate Students will prepare 4 case analyses to present at the end of the semester in a formal 5 minute presentation.

Coach Contract Assignment

The contract assignment presents a good opportunity to demonstrate your understanding about how to find information concerning legal matters relating to contracts. Specifically, you are asked to find a contract on your assigned/chosen coach from one of the various Division I (FBS) institutions and put together a brief description. More information will be provided as the course progresses.

Reading Questions

Reading questions may be presented through D2L on a few significant chapters. You will be required not only to read the chapter but also seek an outside source in your field of choice of how this applies to your field. This will allow you to relate the law concepts to the area of your choice, plus see what your classmates are interested in.

Extra Credit

Extra Credit may be given throughout the semester if it will improve your professional experiences and "toolbox." Opportunities such as professional conferences and volunteering (excluding internship opportunities) for sporting events may be used as such. A written summary of one page will also be required to describe your experience. Only three extra credit opportunities will be given per student, however, you should always continue to grow as a young professional.

Class Participation

Participation is key to understanding the material in this course. Points may be awarded for questions answered in class regarding the readings that were assigned for each lecture. The Instructor may choose to quiz on readings if they suspect that students are not attending class to have a fulfilling class discussion.

Other assignments may be necessary to not only deepen your understanding of the material, but also to make the course more interesting. These assignments may vary in points from 5-30. Please come prepared for class to make it more interesting.

****Graduate Research Presentation****

<u>Legal Research Presentation</u>: Each Graduate student will select a legal topic relating to sport and prepare a legal research presentation. The presentation will include your analysis of your 4 cases and include a summary for the class.

Group Work

Group Projects

Group projects will be in class projects that will cover the topics that we have discussed recently in class. Each member should participate in the group project, which does not mean that the group allows one or two people to do all of the work. It will reflect poorly on your group.

Risk Management Presentation

This will be a GROUP project. Each group will complete a risk analysis of high school athletic facilities, or fitness club within the greater Charleston/Mattoon Area. Each group will travel to a facility and assess the risks and how to improve upon a facility. More details will be presented as the semester progresses.

Current Topic

Each student will be assigned a date to present a current topic and how it applies to the law and sport. The presentation is informal, but you will be required to write a one-page summary with a submission to D2L.

Requirements: Who are the parties involved? Who is the defendant and prosecutor? What is the issue at hand? Who does it affect? How could it affect sport managers or you in the future? Consider what the repercussions of the case or issue may be. Also prepare 2 questions for the class discussion.

Exams

There will be 2 semester examinations and 1 comprehensive final examination. The examinations generally consist of Short answer and multiple choice questions. During the first class meeting as a class we will decide if we want to class examinations or quizzes over the content. We will still finish with a cumulative final.

****Graduate students will take an essay examination for each examination/quiz.****
