- 5 To exercise critical thinking skills.

Conduct of the Course:

- 1. Attendance Attendance at lectures is both expected and graded. Each class session is worth five (5) points. You will be permitted three (2) unexcused absences without penalty. Tests and quizzes missed on days of unexcused absences cannot be made up unless I have been given prior notification. Absences for Approved University events and serious illnesses are excused. Students five (5) minutes late will be considered tardy. Students more than ten (10) minutes late will be considered absent. Two (2) tardies will count as one (1) unexcused absence.
- 2. Performance Attendance You are required to attend the University productions of *Dancing at Lughnasa* and *Brighton Beach Memoirs* and write a reaction paper about each performance. Each production will cost you only \$5 and are held in either The Theatre Dept.'s Black Box Theatre or the Theatre located in The Doudna Fine Arts Center. It is wise to make reservations prior to attending or simply purchase your tickets in advance as some shows have been known to sell out.

If you are concerned about being able to afford purchasing tickets you also have the option of ushering for either production. To be an usher for a production you need to sign up at the box office located in the main concourse of The Doudna Fine Arts Center. To usher you need to wear black shoes and pants and a white top. Ushers show up 15 minutes before the house opens and perform duties such as taking tickets, handing out programs, and helping patrons find seats. Once the house doors close and the show is ready to start you will be permitted to find your own seat and view the performance for **FREE**.

Each production will cost you only \$5.

- 3. Students With Disabilities If you are a student with a documented disability in need of accommodations to fully participate in this class, please contact the Office of Student Disability Services (OSDS). - **4.** Cell Phones As noted earlier, please turn off all phone and electronic devices during this class as a courtesy to your fellow students and myself. This of course includes texting. Students caught texting will lose credit for that class period. Also, headphones and MP3 players are not allowed unless

circumstances and myself allow it. This policy also applies to any live performance you attend. It is extremely rude to use any sort of electronic device during a concert, play, or any other live performance.

- **5. Reading** My lectures are based on the Chapters in your Wilson/Goldfarb book. Reading these chapters in advance will further your understanding of the lecture material. You will be required to read two plays from your Norton Anthology of Drama this semester. You need to have each assigned play read by the time we convene for class as there will be a short quiz on the play at the beginning of the class period.
- 6. Paper Writing All papers submitted in this class must be turned in electronically as a Word document via e-mail or submitted to the correct Dropbox folder on D2L. All papers need to have 1.5 spacing and 1" margins on all sides. The font <u>must be</u> 12 point *Times New Roman*. All papers should have a separate title page that has your name, the date, and the title of the paper.
- 7. Late Assignments All assignments turned in after the assigned due date/time will be docked 10 points per day late.

Assignments

- **1. Bio Project** Your first project this semester. You need to write a short biography of yourself. The bio should be no more than half a page and should take no more than a minute to present to the class. Your bio should contain the following:
 - a. Your name
 - b. Where you are from
 - c. Your major & minor
 - d. Any theatrical experience you may have had
 - e. Something you enjoy (i.e. hobbies, sports, interests, etc... Please try to list something other than eating, sleeping, and hanging out with friends.)
 - f. Organizations you belong to (if applicable)
- 2. Critique Paper The Critique Paper is due at the top of the class period immediately following the closing performance of each of the two (2) productions you are required to see and should be a minimum of two (2) full pages in length (full page means top to bottom). You must submit your

show program with your name written on it at the top of the class immediately following the performance. Failure to turn in your program will automatically lose 25% of the points allotted to the assignment. Additionally you must bring your PantherCard to swipe it with the House Manager both before and at the end of the performance to prove attendance.

Late papers will have 5 points deducted per day late. Papers not meeting the two page <u>minimum</u> requirement will automatically lose one letter grade. As with all papers, a cover page with your name and title of paper (*Insert Name Of Play Here* **Critique Paper**) is expected. Papers missing title page will automatically lose a letter grade.

Critique papers should thoughtfully discuss the play and critique the elements that comprise it (i.e. acting, directing, design elements). Your own opinion is what I'm looking for and you will not be penalized for negative views of the performances. What I'm really looking for is seeing that you put forth honest effort to discuss what you thought of the show and support those thoughts and opinions in an intelligent manner. *IDO NOT WANT A SYNOPSIS OF THE PLAY*.

In your critique of the play, be sure to include a critique of each of the following:

- Acting
- Scenery
- Costumes
- Lighting
- Props

Failure to omit one of the above items will negatively affect your grade on this paper. Finally, when critiquing performers or designers, be sure to reference your program so you can use proper names for each actor or designer as well as proper names for characters portrayed in the play.

- **3. Auditions** To better appreciate one of the aspects of being an actor, you will be required to choose and memorize a short, one-minute monologue to be delivered to the class. The project grade will be broken down as follows:
 - i. Under 15 seconds = 0 points
 - ii. 15 seconds = 25 points
 - iii. 30 seconds = 50 points
 - iv. 45 seconds = 75 points
 - v. 60 seconds = 100 points
- **4. Research Paper** There is one (1) research paper due on Thursday of Mid-Term week. Your paper needs to be a minimum of 4 pages and will be on a topic of your choosing that relates to an aspect of live theatre. A hand out with more information on this is forthcoming.
- **5. Group Project** Because theatre is a collaborative art, you will have one group project to work on. Using "*Oedipus the King*", you will be assigned to a group that will put together a concept for a production. Details on this will be forthcoming.
- **6. Quizzes** There will be nine (9) short quizzes given at the top of class the day following the conclusion of a chapter lecture. Each quiz will have ten (10) multiple choice questions and take no more than 5-10 minutes.
- 7. Exams One (1) Final Exam will be given this semester. The Final Exam will be comprehensive over all lectures covered throughout the semester and may contain questions from other subjects (outside of

the lectures) covered throughout the course of the semester. There will be a study guide for the final exam and there will be nothing on the exam that isn't contained in the study guide. Furthermore, many of the questions on the Final Exam will be taken directly from the quizzes you take throughout the semester. We will also have a Final Exam review session on the final day of class. The Final Exam review is done in game show style similar to TV's **JEOPARDY!** You are allowed to use your notes from the lectures during this review and you will be eligible to earn extra credit points during class at that time.

Extra Credit

Extra credit may be earned one of four (4) ways.

1. Audition for the Spring 2018 production of *Brighton Beach Memoirs* will be on Tuesday, Jan. 16th, 2018 beginning at 6:30pm in the Globe/Theatre. Five (**5**) points will be awarded for auditioning and an additional twenty-five (**25**) points will be awarded for getting cast in and adequately fulfilling your responsibilities in the production. Registration begins at 5:30 p.m., in The Globe Studio, DFAC 1080.

Please prepare a contemporary audition monologue -1-2 minutes. For first time auditioners a reading from the script if no monologue is prepared. Bring a resume' and a headshot (if you have one available). Other paperwork will be picked up at the registration desk when you sign in. Bring a listing of any unavailable times or days in your Fall schedule (excluding day time class schedules).

Call backs will be on Wednesday, Jan. 17th, 2018 in the Globe/Theatre of the Doudna Fine Arts Center from 6:30-9:30pm. Cast lists will be posted outside the Theatre Dept. Office (DFAC 2080) by Noon on Thursday, Jan. 18th, 2017.

- 2. Attending plays outside of your two required performance viewings. Only one (1) high school production may be attended for extra credit. To receive credit, you must turn in your program, ticket stub, and a two page minimum critique of the production. The paper needs to have the same spacing and font as your assigned Reaction Papers. You will earn an additional five (5) points per production you attend on your final grade. Be sure to check with me before attending an outside production to see if I approve it for use as extra credit.
- **3.** You may help out in either the Theatre Department's *Scene Shop* or *Costume Shop*. Five (5) points per hour worked will be earned for up to a maximum of twenty-five (25) points total. A sheet obtained from me will be needed recording your hours and the signatures of crew heads who supervise you.
- 4. You may work on the running crew of a show working behind the scenes of a play which will give you firsthand experience of what goes into running an actual live theatrical play. This will involve coming to <u>ALL</u> tech rehearsals the week leading up to the performance as well as <u>ALL</u> performances of the show. Successful completion of this will earn you an additional twenty-five (25) points. Check with me <u>AS SOON AS POSSIBLE</u> if you're interested in working on a production crew as crew positions tend to fill up quickly by theatre majors and minors.
- **5.** See the EIU theatre Dept. production of *GRUESOME PLAYGROUND INJURIES* for ten (10) extra credit points. As with all other shows, to receive credit for seeing this production you will need to provide a 2 page critique of the production as well as your program and ticket stub. *GPI* runs Feb. 8-10, at 7:30pm in The Globe Studio. Tickets will be \$5.00.
