Catalog Course Description: This course provides a practical guide that complements research methodology content with particular focus on conducting a comprehensive literature review. (Writing Intensive course)

Objectives:

- 1. Conduct a thorough and effective literature search. (Depth of content knowledge; Critical thinking and problem-solving skills)
- 2. Develop skills required for critical reading of literature. (Depth of content knowledge; Critical thinking and problem-solving skills)
- 3. Organize literature into relevant topics and subtopics. (Depth of content knowledge; Critical thinking and problem-solving skills)
- 4. Critically compile, discuss and analyze literature findings. (Effective written communication skills; Evidence of advanced scholarship)
- 5. Establish unbiased conclusions. (Critical thinking and problem-solving skills; Evidence of advanced scholarship)
- 6. Effective oral dissemination and deliberation of findings. (Effective oral communication skills)

Course Outline and Schedule (subject to change):

Since this is hybrid class, some of the objectives will be covered during scheduled class meeting times (weeks 1-5) and others through online and one-on-one instruction (weeks 6-13). As part of the one-on-one instruction, time will be scheduled for students to meet with the instructor as the paper is developed and edited. However, students are also encouraged to meet the instructor as often as needed through the paper's development.

Assignments:

1. Literature search results with list of at least 10 peer

reviewed journal references.	20 points	(Objectives 1-2)
2. Literature review matrix or outline.	20 points	(Objectives 1-3)
3. Rough draft of review of literature paper.	30 points	(Objectives 3 and 4)
4. Final literature of review paper.	200 points	(Objectives 3 and 5)
5. Presentation of literature review.	70 points	(Objective 6

Please review the following expectations as they relate to the oral presentation that students will present to the graduate faculty. Successful competition of the presentation or defense of a thesis are related but separate requirements for graduation.

- a) A passing score for graduation on the oral presentation rubric is 32/40. A student who receives a score below a 32 must redo the oral presentation. A student must meet with the graduate faculty who were present at the oral presentation to discuss strategies that will assist in successfully passing the oral presentation the second time. For students doing a thesis, a successful thesis defense will be determined by the thesis committee.
- b) If a student does not receive a passing score of 32 on the second attempt, the student will receive an INCOMPLETE for the course and will not be on schedule to graduate. A student must meet with the graduate faculty who were present at the oral presentation to discuss strategies that will assist in successfully passing the oral presentation for completion of KSS 5005 and graduation from the KSS graduate program which may not occur until fall semester.
- c) If a student does not receive a passing score on the third attempt, the student will receive the appropriate grade for KSS 5005 but will fail to graduate from the KSS graduate program.
