Eastern Illinois University Athletic Training Education Program KSS 3180 – General Medical Conditions in the Athlete

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Course Description: A study of general medical conditions and disabilities, wound care and management techniques and environmental related conditions found in athletes.

Prerequisites: KSS 2130, KSS 2135, KSS 2136

Required Texts: Cuppert, M. & Walsh, K.M. (2012). *General Medical Conditions in the Athlete, 2nd ed.* Ancillary Text: Prentice, W. (2015). *Principles of Athletic Training, 15th ed.*

Course Objectives: Upon successful completion of this course the student will be able to:

- 1. Develop an understanding of the body's immune system and how athletic activity can affect this system as demonstrated by satisfactory performance on written examinations.
- 2. Demonstrate the ability to identify and assess illnesses and general medical conditions as demonstrated by satisfactory performance on written examinations and completion of case studies.
- 3. Comprehend the environmental conditions involved with certain athletic activities and be able to identify medical conditions associated, with a focus on the heat, as measured by satisfactory performance on written examinations.
- 4. Exhibit proficiency in the safe, effective management of various wounds and the proper use of common general medical equipment, as measured by satisfactory performance on written examinations and satisfactory demonstration on the practical laboratory skill assessments.
- 5. Exhibit the ability to critically analyze an injury scenario and identify possible medical conditions involved as demonstrated through the completion of case studies.

You must be present on the day of the examinations or prior arrangements must be made with the instructor.
