- **c.** Apply clinical skills to recognize and assess injuries to the shoulder complex.
- **d.** Apply clinical skills to recognize and assess postural deformities.
- **e.** Apply clinical skills to recognize and assess injuries to the elbow and upper arm.
- **f.** Apply clinical skills to recognize and assess injuries to the forearm, hand and wrist.
