Course Description: This course introduces students to central theories and discourses of communication ethics. It surveys communication ethics problems and challenges in various public and private communication contexts including interpersonal, mass, and organizational communication as well as public relations. In addition, the course fosters students' ability to recognize, analyze and address communication ethics problems, and to foster ethical communication in their personal and professional lives.

After completion of this course, you will be able to:

1. understand relevant communication theories and discourses.
2. be able to apply relevant theories and concepts to ethical communication problems and challenges.
3. identify and analyze ethical communication challenges and problems in a variety of contexts.
4. develop strategies to address ethical communication challenges and problems in a variety of contexts.
5. foster and apply ethical communication practices.

Online Format: This class takes place 100% online. It requires you to complete one module per week (which you can find under the content tab). You will need to carefully review all instructions for each module on D2L at the beginning of each week, so that you can independently complete all tasks by the deadlines. The deadlines for each task will be posted on D2L, and it is your responsibility to keep track of them. If you are ever unsure, please don't hesitate to contact me.

It is important that you schedule enough time during the week to complete all tasks as you will not be able to complete a module in just one sitting. You will want to make sure to complete the reading assignments before starting your written work for the week, and you will further have several tasks due at different times of the week. I highly recommend logging in to D2L and checking your D2L email and newsfeed regularly to receive all updates regarding our class. Waiting until the last minute will leave no time to ask questions or troubleshoot in case you run into problems. In addition, the class requires your continuous and active participation in written discussions on the D2L discussion board and activities throughout each week.

The weekly modules will be available each Saturday and close each Sunday at midnight (except during the first and last week of our term).

Weekly Discussion Posts, Activities, and Assignments (25%). Each week, you will complete one or more weekly assignments, which include discussion posts and other tasks. Some assignments will be assessed for completion (pass/fail) while others will be graded (this will be indicated on the weekly assignment sheet). Detailed instructions will be posted each week. Make sure to ask questions and seek my help with these assignments early.

Participation & Discussion Responses (15%). Your active participation in discussions and class activities is a vital part of this class. Responding meaningfully to discussion posts and contributing to all shared/group activities is key for this part of your grade.

Reflection Essays (25%). Based on our readings you will write three reflection essays (week 2, week 4, and week 6) in response to a prompt. These assignments will be posted on D2L with detailed instructions.

Final Project and Presentation (35%). At the end of the term, you will submit a written communication ethics case study that provides an in-depth analysis of ethical problems, challenges and solutions. In addition, you will submit a presentation of your case. Detailed instructions will be posted on D2L.

Readings. In order to do well on all assignments, it is crucial that you complete all assigned readings. You are always welcome to contact me with any questions that came up for you in the readings and that you did not have a chance to address in our weekly discussions or assignments.

Course Policies

Late Work: Late work, which is every assignment submitted after the deadline, will be dropped by one letter grade (10%) per day it is late and only accepted until two days after the initial due date. Any work handed in after that will receive 0 points.
