Course description: Supervised, journalism-related experiences on student media outlets, focusing on information-gathering, writing, editing, photography, design, online journalism and electronic journalism on student media such as The Daily Eastern News, The Warbler, *News Watch* and HitMit 88.9 FM

Prerequisites: JOU 2001 and a minimum grade of "C" in JOU 2101.

Course Objectives:

- To provide practical journalistic experience for students.
- To give students guidance on the development of their journalistic skills.
- To augment classroom instruction with guided practical experience. Producing journalistic products in a real setting helps students better understand the free flow of information in a democratic society.

Evaluation:

- Student work will be critiqued by the instructor, in a personal conference at midterms an at the end of the semester.
- Student work will also be evaluated on a regular basis by the editor, editorial adviser, station manager or news director to which the student is assignment. This will provide vital instruction as the work is being done.
- Students must attend meetings with newsroom managers.
- Students must attend three (3) sessions with the instructor.
- Students must prepare and present a satisfactory professional portfolio of their work, which will be reviewed by the instructor and/or members of the journalism faculty.
- Student work may be evaluated by the professional journalists after they have received a grade in the course as part of the department's assessment program. This will provide valuable insight into the improvement of the journalism program.
- **Minimum** requirements: For the print media: 1-2 assignments per week. For broadcast: two days per week in the studio or where assigned.

Course schedule:

Weeks 1-15: Students will work on a student media outlet: The Daily Eastern News, The Warbler, News Watch, HitMix88.9 FM. Additional arrangements can be made with instructor for alternate media assignments.

Journalism Student Code of Conduct

According to university policy, students who plagiarize can be dismissed from EIU.
