DESCRIPTION: (2-2-3) On Demand. Photographic work in journalism with emphasis on photo content. 3.000 Credit hours

LEARNING OBJECTIVES:

- 1. Define photojournalism
- 2. Identify key photojournalistic genres
- 3. Photograph single events and extended picture stories
- 4. Identify and seek out news and editorial sources
- 5. Research news and editorial subjects before the shoot
- 6. Execute interviewing skills required for gathering cutline/caption information
- 7. Use Associated Press Style to write photo captions
- 8. Prepare correct lighting for location shoots
- 9. Produce portraits in environmental and studio settings
- 10. Identify and practice professional ethics required in photojournalism
- 11.Identify and practice applicable media law and access tenets employed by photojournalists

REQUIRED EQUIPMENT: You are expected to have regular access to a digital camera for this course. A DSLR (Digital Single Lens Reflex) camera is ideal and the ability to capture RAW file format is especially beneficial. EIU provides a basic DSLR camera kit for semester-long checkout (if needed). You are responsible for the equipment for the entire semester. It is HIGHLY recommended that you have access to additional lenses such as a wide-angle and telephoto zoom lenses. There

is a limited amount of gear available on campus to checkout so you should check other sources.

Your are expected to have and access and familiarity with image editing software in order to resize your images to specifications for assignment uploads. The school provides an Adobe Creative Cloud subscription for students including Photoshop and Bridge.

You are expected to have regular access to a computer and internet connection (high speed broadband is ideal).

DEADLINES: All photography assignments must meet posted deadlines. Late photography assignments are for only one week past the due date and will be graded at a maximum of 60% (though lower grades are possible depending on the quality of the work.) Assignments submitted late are NOT eligible for REDO. THERE ARE NO EXCEPTIONS TO THIS POLICY.

EXTRA CREDIT: If your work is published this semester online, in a newspaper or magazine you will receive extra credit for the class. Your name must be printed along with the picture. Bring a copy of the tear sheet (or e-mail link) for credit. There may be other opportunities for extra credit pictures with some assignments in this class.

REDO'S: Any on-time assignments are eligible for redo for a POSSIBLE grade increase by Week 14. Grade increases are not guaranteed; the point of submitting a redo is to produce an improvement upon your previous work. Redo's will NOT be accepted or graded after Week 14.

METADATA PRESET-FILE INFO/IPTC CAPTION: All images must be captioned following the guidelines given and include all original EXIF data. You ARE required to include the full names of your subjects. Images without captions will be graded with a score of '0' (zero).

ORIGINAL WORK: All work submitted in this course must be your own. You must shoot your own images, use your own gear, submit your own digital files and shoot within the timelines of the class. Your assignment must be shot on camera

RAW but turned in as a .jpg. You may be called upon to provide the camera RAW original files so keep those files in your archive. If you cannot provide the original camera RAW file upon request, you will not receive credit for the assignment and may be reported to the School for academic dishonesty. Contributions from anyone or anything else – including AI sources – must be properly quoted and cited every time they are used. Any text generating software is not permitted, and it will be treated as plagiarism. Failure to comply with this policy will be considered an academic integrity violation and will be subject to EIU's academic dishonesty process. The EIU Student Code of Conduct is available from the Dean of Students.

QUIZZES AND EXAMS: MUST be taken before the posted deadlines. Failure to do so will result in a grade of zero which may not be "made up." Students experiencing an extraordinary problem with completing an exam before the deadline must contact the instructor BEFORE the deadline to make other arrangements.

ACTIVITIES: There will be weekly written homework called 'Activities.' These takehome assignments are designed to foster discussion in the class. Activity topics are similar to what will be discussed in classroom lecture. Research the topic (often associated with the text book), write 250-500 words on the given topic and upload to D2L. Be prepared to discuss your findings in a classroom discussion.
