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Homeland Security Grant Program	
The purpose of the Homeland Security Grant Program (HSGP) is to support state and local efforts to prevent terrorism and other catastrophic events and to prepare the nation for the threats and hazards that pose the greatest risk to the security of the United States. This grant has two separate funding streams.	
 State Homeland Security Program (SHSP): The SHSP assists state, tribal, territorial and local preparedness activities that address high-priority preparedness gaps across all core capabilities where a nexus to terrorism exists. 	
 <u>Urban Areas Security Initiative (UASI)</u>: The UASI Program assists high-threat, high-density urban areas in efforts to build, sustain and deliver the capabilities necessary to prevent, protect against, mitigate, respond to, and recover from acts of the program of terrorism. In Illinois, the defined urban area is Cook County, including Chicago. 	
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Emergency Management Performance Grant Program	
The purpose of the Emergency Management Performance Grant Program (EMPG) is to provide federal funds to states to assist state, local, territorial and tribal governments in preparing for all hazards. The federal government, through the EMPG Program, provides necessary direction, coordination, guidance and assistance to support a comprehensive all hazards emergency preparedness	
 system. EMPG supports 123 local Emergency Management Agencies (EMA's) throughout the State to cover costs for day-to-day emergency management activities.

Non-Profit Security Grant Program The Non-Profit Security Grant Program (NSGP) provides funding support for target	
hardening and other physical security enhancements for nonprofit organizations that are at high risk of a terrorist attack. NSGP seeks to integrate the preparedness activities of non-profit organizations with broader state and local preparedness	
efforts. There are two funding sources appropriated for non-profit organizations:	
 Non-Profit Security Grant Program - State (NSGP-S): Under NSGP-S, each state will receive a target allocation for non-profit organizations located outside of Urban Area Security Initiative (UASI) designated urban areas. 	

•Non-Profit Security Grant Program - Urban Area (NSGP-UA): Under NSGP-UA, each state will receive a target allocation for non-profit organizations located within UASI designated urban areas.

Non-Profit Security Grant Program Uses

Both the NSGP-S and NSGP-UA funds must be used for target-hardening activities:

- Purchase or installation of security equipment on real property (including buildings and improvements) owned or leased by the non-profit organization
- \bullet Security enhancements must be for the locations that the non-profit occupies at the time of the application
- •Projects must be fully completed during the three-year performance period





Hazardous Materials Emergency Preparedness Grant Program

The purpose of the Hazardous Materials $\operatorname{\overline{E}mergency}$ Preparedness Grant Program (HMEP) is to:

- Increase state, territorial, tribal, and local effectiveness in safely and efficiently handling hazardous materials incidents;
- > Enhance implementation of the Emergency Planning and Community Rightto-Know Act of 1986 (EPCRA)
- > Encourage a comprehensive approach to emergency training and planning by incorporating the unique challenges of response to transportation situations.
- HMEP supports over 30 Local Emergency Planning Committees (LEPC's) throughout the State to cover costs for day-to-day hazardous materials transportation planning and training.
- State to cover costs for day-to-day hazardous materials transportation planning and training.

 Illinois leads the nation in the number of hazardous materials items transported through the state.





National Earthquake Hazards Reduction Grant Program

The National Earthquake Hazardous Reduction Grant Program (NEHRP) prioritizes reducing the risks to life and property from future earthquakes in the United States through the establishment and maintenance of an effective earthquake hazards reduction program.

- •IEMA collaborates with the Central United States Earthquake Consortium (CUSEC) to meet the grants programs objectives by:
- > Improving understanding of earthquake processes and impacts,
- > Developing cost-effective measures to reduce earthquake impacts on individuals, the built environment, and society-at-large,

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IEMAs Hazard Mitigation Grants Role

The mission of IEMAs Mitigation Program is to identify hazards that affect Illinois, assess how vulnerable the State is to each hazard, and then implement a strategy for mitigating the effects of the hazard. The mitigation grant programs aim to shift the focus from reactive disaster spending toward proactive and research-supported investments in community mitigation.

- Good mitigation projects are ones that demonstrate innovative approaches to partnerships, such as shared funding mechanisms, and/or project design
- •Projects can protect either public or private property.
- •Eligible projects must be environmentally sound, cost-effective, solve a problem and prevent future disaster damages.
