





Dr. Hiram Rutherford, a physician in the prairie town of Oakland, was a known abolitionist in Illinois. He built his two-story frame house off the square in Oakland in 1847, and his one-room office in 1850. The cost of building the house was reported at \$1600, and was considered pretentious. Dr. Rutherford is notable for his association with the Matson Trial of 1847, the only known case in which Abraham Lincoln defended a slave owner. FIRE AND FREEDOM: FOOD AND ENSLAVEMENT IN EARLY AMERICA

"Fire and Freedom: Food and Enslavement in Early America," an exhibit from the National Library of Medicine/National Institutes of Health, will be on display at Booth Library from Oct. 12-Nov. 21, 2020. Meals can tell us how power is exchanged between and among different peoples, races, genders, and classes. Fire and Freedom: Food and Enslavement in Early America looks at the Chesapeake region, during the early colonial era, where European settlers relied upon indentured servants, Native Americans, and African slave labor for life-saving knowledge of farming and food acquisition,

and to gain economic prosperity. It is through the labor of slaves, like those at George Washington's Mount Vernon, that we can learn about the ways that meals transcend taste and sustenance. Gillespie will discuss the historical and contemporary circumstances of poverty and food insecurity, from Early America to today.

Michael D. Gillespie is associate professor of Sociology at Eastern Illinois University, which he joined after completing his Ph.D. at Western Michigan University. His research is focused on poverty and food insecurity in Coles County and the Eastern Illinois region.

For over 300 years, the people of Poland have kept an annual tradition of walking across the country to make pilgrimage to the monastery of Jasna Góra, there to venerate the centuries old Byzantine icon and national treasure, the Black Madonna of Częstochowa. The pilgrimage itself has become a part of national heritage and lived cultural expression, being one of the largest visible features of Polish national identity. In August of 2019, the 28th International Military Walking Pilgrimage, organized and supported by the Polish military and inviting the participation of several international

military partners, included two local men from EIU as participants. Representing the Illinois National Guard, they joined the national military of Poland along with other international military delegations from Germany, Slovakia, and Lithuania. In this pilgrimage of peace, they served as ambassadors, seeking to build bridges, cultivate mutual understanding and promote good will among the nations. One a Catholic Chaplain and faculty member at EIU, the other a Religious Affairs Airman and civil service employee at Booth Library, each of these men brought to and took away from this pilgrimage something uniquely valuable to them personally and professionally as Illinois Guardsmen, Indeed, every participant in the pilgrimage reflects the unique experience of each, whether Catholic, non-Catholic, or not religious at all. This extraordinary encounter will be recounted from two distinct perspectives in an attempt to share a truly once in a lifetime experience walking over 200 miles in 10 days across Poland


