### Mary Josephine Booth 1876-1965

First librarian at Eastern Illinois University, Mary Josephine Booth served as Red Cross relief worker during World War I, state treasure of the Illinois Library Association, state president of the Illinois Library Association, member of the Daughters of the American Revolution, Women's Oversees Service League, and the American Association of University Women.

#### Chronology

- 1876 (May 24)- Mary Josephine Booth born at Beloit, WI.
- 1900- Booth received Bachelor of arts degree from Beloit College.
- 1904- Booth received Library Science degree from University of Illinois Library School.
- 1904- Booth hired as librarian at Eastern Normal School.
- 1913- Booth appointed as Illinois Library Association state treasurer. Served until 1915.
- 1915- Booth appointed Illinois Library Association state president. Served until 1916.
- 1916- Cyclone strikes Mattoon and Charleston. Mary Booth serves as head of the Red Cross relief work.
- 1917 Mary Booth volunteers for active duty in World War I.
- 1917 (Nov 27)- Booth arrives in France and serves as Red Cross canteener.

1945 (Sept 1)- Booth retires from Eastern Normal School.

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1947 (July)- Eastern Normal School changed to Eastern Illinois State College.

1948 (Feb 2)- Ground broken for the Mary Josephine Booth Library on Eastern's campus. Booth turns first spadeful of dirt.

1950 (May 27)- Booth cuts ribbon across main entrance and is first person to enter the building named in her honor.

1950- Booth receives honorary degree of Doctor of Literature from Beloit (WI) College.

1957 (July 5)- Eastern Illinois State College changed to Eastern Illinois University.

1965 (Jan 2) Mary Josephine Booth dies at 6:30 a.m. at Charleston Hospital at the age of eighty-eight.
