### 2. Rationale for proposal:

Art 5602 could be taken to fulfill three of the six hours of studio art required for the MA in Art with Art Education Option and MA in Art with Community Art Option. This course is a one-week, on-campus graduate-level studio art course designed to address the specific needs of students most likely to pursue these degree options. Most will be non-traditional students with limited ability to come to campus for the six- or eight-week summer sessions because they live more than an hour's drive from Charleston plus they have employment and family responsibilities. A one-week intensive studio course with the opportunity to complete a final project or portfolio of artwork by end of the summer session aids their timely completion of degree requirements.

### **2.** Catalog description:

This course is an immersive study of the tools, techniques, and creative possibilities afforded by the use of computers and digital technologies as a visual art medium. This course is a one-week, on-campus graduate-level studio art course designed to address the specific needs of students pursuing the MA in Art with Art Education Option. This class will explore digital photography, photomanipulation and digital painting/drawing. We will concentrate on the use of the digital imaging programs as our primary tool for creating successful works of art. Class will consist of demonstrations, slide presentations and critiques. Students will work on assigned problems in and outside of class.
