Program Revision

The following changes are requested for the recently revised MA program in Political Science:

CGS Agenda Item: 16-41

Effective: Fall 2016

- 1) The Department of Political Science was not aware of the implications of using the word "track" instead of "option" in our program language. Tracks are interpreted as concentrations, which cannot be tracked within Banner. The Graduate School and Continuing Education have requested that we use the word "option" to allow proper tracking of online student enrollment. In our revision, the two tracks from the original proposal (approved in February 2016) become options. Please note that this change does not affect the curriculum, learning objectives, or program delivery in any way. We are changing words to accommodate coding in Banner.
- 2) Because we are an MA in PLS, and an MA in PLS with an option in Public Administration/Public **Policy**, we split the language in the program mission to clarify career opportunities.
- 3) We indicate that the MA in PLS with the option in Public Administration/Public Policy is an online program. This language was not in the original proposal, but was added by the Graduate School for catalog language conformity.

CURRENT LANGUAGE

M.A. in Political Science

Program Mission: The program provides a flexible curriculum for students interested in American government, comparative politics, international relations, public administration, and public policy. Students will receive training in the advanced analytical, methodological, and theoretical approaches used in political science. The curriculum prepares students for work in public affairs, including employment in all levels of government, non-profit management, legal careers, lobbying, private sector government relations, and higher education. The program also prepares students for future-Ph.D. or legal studies. Internships related to government, politics and the legal system are available.

Admission Requirements: To be eligible for degree candidacy, applicants must meet all of the requirements for admission to the Graduate School (see "Admission to Graduate Degree and Certificate Programs"). All applicants must submit a statement of personal goals and two letters of recommendation from faculty or professionals familiar with the applicant's academic training and potential for success in graduate school.

Degree Audit: The graduate plan of study is the EIU Degree Audit, which is generated automatically in the Degree Audit Reporting System (DARS) at the time of degree or certificate candidacy. Modifications of the standard EIU Degree Audit are submitted by the graduate coordinator to the certification officer in the Graduate School at the time modifications are approved. The Degree Audit serves as an unofficial summary of requirements for the program. Degree and certificate candidates are advised to review the comprehensive summary of the Degree Audit process specified on the "Requirements for All Degree and Certificate Candidates" section of the Graduate Catalog. Individual programs may require candidates to submit plans of study in addition to the Degree Audit, candidates should consult with the program coordinator.
