2.	Rationale for proposal: As the new online PLS program (the option in Public
	Administration and Public Policy) has developed and grown, and as our face-to-face MA in
	PLS continues, assessment indicates that we need two different methods courses for our
	students. This new course will focus on the specific research methods skills required for
	students in the fields of public administration, public policy, and nonprofit management.
3.	Justifications for (answer N/A if not applicable)
	Similarity to other courses: About 25 percent of the course material will be similar to our
	face-to-face graduate research methods course (PLS 5053), particularly in terms of research
	design, sampling, and quantitative methods. However, the majority of this course will focus
	on applied research methods appropriate for students in online MA in Political Science with
	the Public Administration and Public Policy option. This course would also be similar to
	other graduate level research methods courses in the social sciences, but the content focuses
	on applied work in political science, public administration, public policy, and nonprofit
	management.

5. Online/Hybrid delivery justification & assurances (answer N/A if not applicable)

Assessment: NA

Online or hybrid delivery justification: Our MA in Political Science with the option in Public Administration and Public Policy is all online. This course must be online for students to complete the program.

Instruction: The course will be delivered primarily via the LMS at EIU (currently D2L), although email and other online technologies may be used occasionally. The primary difference between the online course and the face-to-face course will be the conduit for discussion, with a discussion board instead of a classroom. The faculty and students can facilitate a rich discussion in either learning environment. The technology will be used to support student achievement by allowing them to interact with one another and the instructor at times which are convenient for them. All online instructors must complete OCDi training or the equivalent before teaching the course.

<u>Integrity</u>: The integrity of student work will be assured through repeated writing assignments. Given that students often have signature writing styles or voices, having someone else submit a single assignment will be evident to the instructor. In addition, all assignments are checked through on-line mechanisms for plagiarism.

<u>Interaction</u>: Instructor-student and student-student interaction will be promoted through a variety of means, including (but not limited to) the LMS discussion board, email, feedback on individual assignments, peer review, and online chats. Faculty are also available to meet students via phone conversation or on campus for a face-to-face meeting.

used, such as O'Sullivan, Rassel and Taliaferro's *Practical Research Methods for Nonprofit and Public Administration* (Routledge, 2011).

Weeks 1 & 2/Module 1: Introduction to Research in Nonprofits & Public Programs Topics: research questions, variables, reliability, validity, ethics in research

Weeks 3 & 4/Module 2: Performance Measures

Topics: Data collection for evaluating performance, measurement scales, frequency distributions, rates and percentage change, measures of central tendency

Weeks 5 & 6/Module 3: Citizen/Community Surveys Topics: Sampling, surveys, interviews, focus groups

Weeks 7 & 8/Module 4: Quantitative Analysis

Topics: Contingency tables, correlation, regression, inferential statistics

Weeks 9 & 10/Module 5: Qualitative Analysis

Topics: Case study techniques, interpreting qualitative data, coding text

Weeks 11 & 12/Module 6: Program Evaluation & Community Needs Assessment Topics: Conducting and evaluating policy analysis

Week 13/Final Project Conferences

Students have individualized meetings with instructors for their final projects.

Week 14/Module 8: Assembling and presenting research

Topics: Audience needs, types of presentations, writing up results, data visualization

Week 15/Student Presentations

Finals Week: Final project due
