RATIONALE:

MSND: DI Option

The proposed changes were designed to lower the total cost of the program by reducing the number of semester hours needed, which makes the program more accessible to students. The new Research Methodologies in Nutrition and Dietetics (FCS 5600) incorporates key content from FCS 5900 and FCS 5152. The addition of the hours to FCS 5150, FCS 5152, and FCS 5154 are needed to better prepare the graduate students for the Dietetic Internship.

MSND: NE Option

The proposed changes were designed to lower the total cost of the program by reducing the number of semester hours needed, as well as to be able to offer the required courses all online for the proposed MSND: NE online option. This makes the program more accessible to and cost effective for students. Students can enroll in either the on campus or online NE program.
