<u>Integrity</u>: Papers will be on specialized topics that make plagiarism difficult and reinforce analytic and critical thinking skills. Plagiarism software such as Turnitin.com may be used.

<u>Interaction</u>: Interaction will be facilitated via email, phone, video, discussion boards or other shared online support as determined by the particular faculty member. As

online courses provide learning environments for people mostly unable to attend oncampus courses due to work or distance issues, interactions will be asynchronous.

Students taking the course for graduate credit will be expected to complete projects at a more advanced level. Arguments will be expected to be more fully developed (requiring a paper, for example, to be longer) and writing and research in the area of study will be expected to make fine-grained distinctions. Students are expected to show a mastery of the material they are discussing, an advanced understanding of key ideas and distinctions, make appropriate use of relevant terms and concepts, avoid inconsistencies, and be sure each point actually advances the thesis. Of course, spelling, grammar and sentence structure must be correct. Creativity and originality are important parts of the project for graduate credit.
