#### **MEMORANDUM**

TO: College of Arts and Humanities Curriculum Committee

**RE**: Proposed Program Revisions

DATE: April 11, 2018

The Department of English requests approval to implement a number of revisions to the MA English curriculum and the corresponding Graduate Catalogue language. Our goal is to accomplish three things: facilitate smoother navigation of the curriculum by students, accommodate the offering of a proposed fully online English MA degree option, and meet the needs of working professionals earning their English MA in a fully online capacity.

The most salient changes we propose are to:

- 1) suspend—and remove from the Graduate Catalogue—the Professional Writing concentration per the Professional Writing Committee's recommendations
- 2) replace the Exam Option (36 total credit hours) with a new Non-Thesis Option (33 total credit hours)
- 3) standardize the required minimum credit hours to 33 total credit hours (for the Literary Studies Concentration and the Composition/Rhetoric Concentration) and 34 total credit hours (for the Literary Studies with an Emphasis in Creative Writing Concentration)
- 4) remove ENG 5500 (the 1-credit hour Writing Center Practicum required of all Graduate Assistants) from the courses falling under the restricted category: "A maximum of 9 semester hours in combination of independent study, research, or thesis may be applied to a degree."

#### **CURRENT CATALOGUE LANGUAGE: English Graduate Program**

NOTE: This marked-up draft shows changes made to the current catalogue language. Yellow highlighting indicates minor changes and blue highlighting indicates more substantive changes.

**Program Mission:** The Master of Arts in English offers students opportunities to pursue advanced training in one of four three areas of concentration: Literary Studies, Literary Studies with Creative Writing emphasis, and Composition/Rhetoric and Professional Writing. The program will prepare students for careers in a variety of fields, including secondary and college-level teaching, editing and publishing, creative writing, research and technical writing in either the private or the public sector. Master of Arts graduates will also be prepared to undertake further study at the doctoral level. Close contact with the department's excellent graduate faculty allows students to deepen their knowledge of literary study, the teaching of writing and literature, and the use of technology for both scholarly and practical research. Graduate assistantships, internships, mentorships, and some classroom teaching are available and integrated into students' individualized programs of study.

**Admission Requirements:** To be eligible for degree candidacy, applicants must meet all of the requirements for admission to the Graduate School (see "<u>Admission to Graduate Degree and Certificate Programs</u>"). A GRE score may be submitted but is not required for admission. The following will be is required on the program application accessed and submitted through MyEIU:

- two letters of recommendation: Provide email addresses for two recommenders
- Personal statement of purpose: Upload a statement of 500-750 words that explains your reasons for undertaking graduate study, your academic preparation, your interests and goals.
- writing sample: Upload a writing sample of no more than thirty pages in length critical writing that shows us your ability to think and write critically on one of the following: 1) a subject related to English; 2) the academic interests you intend to pursue in graduate school; 3) an area of study in which you have research and writing experience. Students interested in the Creative Writing concentration are strongly encouraged to upload a creative writing sample in addition to the critical writing sample. Your sample should be no more than 20 pages in length.
- Upload a curriculum vitae or résumé.
- international students must also document a minimum TOEFL score of at least-600 (paper-based), 250 (computer-based), or 100 (internet-based)

**Degree Audit:** The graduate plan of study is the EIU Degree Audit, which is generated automatically in the Degree Audit Reporting System (DARS) at the time of degree or certificate candidacy. Modifications of the standard EIU Degree Audit are submitted by the graduate coordinator to the certification officer in the Graduate School at the time modifications are approved. The Degree Audit serves as an unofficial summary of requirements for the program. Degree and certificate candidates are advised to review the comprehensive summary of the Degree Audit process specified on the "Requirements for All Degree and Certificate Candidates" section of the Graduate Catalog. Individual programs may require candidates to submit plans of study in addition to the Degree Audit; candidates should consult with the program coordinator.

## **Degree Requirements**

Degree requirements include those outlined for the master's degree by the Graduate School (see "<u>Requirements for the Master's Degree</u>"). A maximum of 9 12 semester hours earned in scheduled English courses numbered 4750-4999 and/or (with prior approval) of courses numbered 5000 and above in other departments can be applied towards the Master of Arts in English. Degree candidates in

English must meet all degree requirements stipulated by the Graduate School.

In addition, The Master of Arts in English requires either satisfactory completion of 33 total semester hours. Students choose either the **Thesis Option**, which requires 27-30 hours of coursework and a 3-6-hour thesis course (ENG 5950), or the **Non-Thesis Option**, which requires 33 hours of coursework. passing a comprehensive examination, All students are required to take Introduction to Methods and Issues in English Studies (ENG 5000) and required courses specific to one of three concentrations: Literary Studies, Literary Studies with a Creative Writing Emphasis, or Composition/Rhetoric.

Students with competitively-awarded Graduate Assistantships are required to work in EIU's Writing Center and must take these graduate courses in addition to their elective courses, regardless of the chosen concentration:
