Dear Dean Hendrickson,

I write to request that William (Woody) Skinner, a Unit B faculty member of the English Department, be granted status as an associate member of the graduate faculty, with permission to advise theses and to serve as a thesis reader.

Dr. Skinner, as you can see from his CV, is an award-winning, experienced creative writer and holder of an MFA (in many places considered the terminal degree for creative writers) as well as a PhD. He also has experience editing literary journals, which is important in advising creative writers.

Although Dr. Skinner was not hired through a national search, he is as qualified as any first-year tenure-track faculty member we have hired during my time in EIU's English Department. He is already making significant contributions to our literary journal, where he will work in a mentoring role with both graduate and undergraduate students.

For students in the MA Literature with Creative Writing emphasis who wish to specialize in fiction, Dr. Skinner is an ideal adviser. None of our Unit A creative writing faculty specialize in fiction writing. In order to fully support this track of our MA program, we need to make him available to thesis writing students as a potential primary adviser and as a thesis reader. He is not currently scheduled to teach a graduate course, but after our next retirement in creative writing (summer 19), we will need him in the creative writing rotation at both undergraduate and graduate levels.
