Dear Dean Hendrickson,

I am writing to ask for special dispensation for Prof. Brian Mann in granting him associate graduate faculty status in the History Department. This unusual request arises from unusual circumstances. Brian is our only Middle East expert, and he also happens to be a Unit B faculty member without a terminal degree. I am hoping for an exception to the "tested experience" provision in IGP #30, if it is deemed necessary. Brian does have his M.A. in History from the University of Texas at Austin and is ABD there as well, with advanced work completed on the modern Middle East. He has been an active and vital member of our department, serving as undergraduate advisor, webmaster, and this year as the interim coordinator of our teacher certification program. Over the past year he has engaged in outreach with a series of public lectures that have highlighted the department's role in commemorating important events in the Middle East, and these lectures have been informed by his own expertise in the subject.

Brian is also vital to our graduate program. Having him available to offer courses in the modern Middle East fulfills significant needs in our curriculum: first, obviously the Middle East itself is an important subject for history graduate students to learn about, especially in the 21st century; second, his courses fulfill the Modern World requirement for those students who choose Modern for their major or minor concentration. For this reason Brian has also served as a representative of the Modern World concentration on MA exam committees for years. He is currently on three such committees, as well as two thesis committees. These students have worked with him and anticipate that he will be one of their examiners on their MA exams. Unfortunately, staffing changes in recent years have led us to have only a few modernists among our faculty. This makes his role in keeping our graduate curriculum viable and in fulfilling program needs all the more essential.

I understand the gravity of this request, and I do very much appreciate the consideration given to this matter. I am happy to follow up with additional information as requested.
