- 2. Rationale for proposal: Ethics is a key component to managing in the public or non-profit sectors. Often misunderstood, ethics is not merely choosing between right and wrong; oftentimes an administrator is faced with multiple choices and then must choose the best alternative. Learning how to choose that alternative is the goal of this course. Studies show the best way to learn how to make ethical decisions is through practice. For this reason, this course will focus heavily on a case study approach where students will be presented with cases and then must select an ethical alternative.
- 3. Justifications for (answer N/A if not applicable)

Similarity to other courses: While the PHI department offers a course on ethics, it is at the undergraduate level and does not focus on ethical conduct in the context of being a public administrator. Graduate level courses involving ethics exist in other programs (e.g. Communication Studies, School Psychology) but are specific to those disciplines and fields.

- 5. Online/Hybrid delivery justification & assurances (answer N/A if not applicable)
- **6.** Online or hybrid delivery justification: Our MA in Political Science with the option in Public Administration and Public Policy is all online. This course must be online for students to complete the program.

- 7. Instruction: The course will be delivered primarily via the LMS at EIU (currently D2L), although email and other online technologies may be used occasionally. The primary difference between the online course and the face-to-face course will be the conduit for discussion, with a discussion board instead of a classroom. The faculty and students can facilitate a rich discussion in either learning environment. The technology will be used to support student achievement by allowing them to interact with one another and the instructor at times which are convenient for them. All online instructors must complete OCDi training or the equivalent before teaching the course.
- **8.** <u>Integrity</u>: The integrity of student work will be assured through repeated writing assignments. Given that students often have signature writing styles or voices, having someone else submit a single assignment will be evident to the instructor. In addition, all assignments are checked through on-line mechanisms for plagiarism.
- 9. <u>Interaction</u>: Instructor-student and student-student interaction will be promoted through a variety of means, including (but not limited to) the LMS discussion board, email, feedback on individual assignments, peer review, and online chats. Faculty are also available to meet students via phone conversation or on campus for a face-to-face meeting.
