ACTION REQUESTED:

Change of name for the interdisciplinary Gerontology Master's program from Gerontology to *Aging Studies*.

RATIONALE:

The interdisciplinary Gerontology MA program has been active at EIU for over 30 years. While the need for professionals in the field continues to rapidly expand, attracting people to the field of aging continues to be a challenge. Undergraduate students are either unaware of what gerontology is or believe that gerontology professionals only work with frail elderly people in health care settings. The reality is that gerontology is the study of the aging process. The current EIU gerontology faculty have agreed that changing the name to Aging Studies could reinvigorate the graduate program at the same time reflect a life course approach to aging that emphasizes engagement and activity rather than frailty and illness. Because the master's program is currently updating its curriculum and transforming to a low-residency online cohort program, now would be the most appropriate time to change the name of the program. After seeking feedback from Gerontology program alumni and professionals in the field, the faculty received unanimous support for the name change.
