CHE FACULTY AND ALUMNI CONTINUES WORK ON SIX-FIGURE GRANT

In Fall 2023, Dr. Danessa Carter (Clinical Mental Health Counseling) was awarded a twoyear, \$223, 280 grant from the Lumpkin Family Foundation to expand mental health outreach in rural Coles County. This initiative aims to educate the community about available mental health resources, teach coping skills, and reduce stigma surrounding mental health care.

As part of the project, graduate students deliver 45- to 60-minute presentations that include a pre- and post-test, a verbal presentation, and a free self-care bag for each participant. The results so far have been encouraging—data from the pre- and post-tests indicate a measurable increase in participants' knowledge and awareness of mental health resources and coping strategies.

This impactful initiative will continue through Summer 2025, making a lasting difference in the community while providing valuable hands-on experience for our graduate students. Congratulations to Dr. Carter on this outstanding achievement!

GLORIA LEITSCHUH AWARD SEES FIRST RECIPIENTS

Debbi Smith, Guidance and Counseling, 1988

Debbi Smith, a Licensed Clinical Professional Counselor, earned both her Bachelor of Science in Sociology (1985) and Master of Science in Education (1988) from Eastern Illinois University. With a deep commitment to children's mental health, Debbi began her career in a psychiatric hospital, where she specialized in treatment protocols for children with Reactive Attachment Disorder. Notably, she established the facility's first Play Therapy program, laying the foundation for more developmentally responsive care.

Her career continued with the development and direction of a group home serving pre-adolescent youth in the DCFS system. She then became Clinical Director at Centerpoint Behavioral Health Center in Champaign, where she expanded outpatient and crisis services for children and adolescents. In partnership with DCFS, she led initiatives such as Intensive Therapeutic Services (ITS) and Screening, Assessment, and Support Services (SASS).

Debbi concluded her distinguished 37-year career in mental health as the Executive Director of the Community and Residential Services Authority (CRSA). In this statewide leadership role, she coordinated efforts to serve children with the most severe mental health needs. Her work included close collaboration with legislators, state agencies, and the Governor's office, culminating in her co-authorship of the landmark Children's Mental Health Act. Throughout her career, Debbi has been a tireless advocate for children and families. Her visionary leadership and unwavering dedication have left a lasting impact on systems of care and on the countless lives she has touched.



Kasey Evans, CSA, 2015

Hendrix College has named Kasey Evans its new Vice President for Enrollment following an extensive nationwide search. Evans will join the Hendrix staff in March. Originally from Tennessee, Evans currently serves as Associate Vice President for Enrollment Management and Dean of Admissions at Illinois Wesleyan University. Four CHE alumni received awards at the College of Education Alumni Awards in the fall. Emmanuel Ayiku and Sierra Hollenbeck received the Rising Star Award. These awards are given to alumni within 10 years of their graduation who are making a significant contribution in their field or career. Debbi Smith and Jennifer Waller received the Lifetime Achievement Award, given to alumni who are living role models in their disciplines and have attained distinguished professional success and prominence.

COLLEGE OF EDUCATION THESIS OF EXCELLENCE



Jacob Mueller CSA, SP 24

Jacob Muller (SP24) received the EIU College of Education Master's Thesis of Excellence Awards for the 2023-2024, respectively. Muller's thesis focused on understanding how academic faculty perceive student-athletes at a midsized Midwestern Division-I university. This qualitative study explored the factors that shape these perceptions, including faculty members' exposure to student-athletes outside the classroom, their awareness of the demands placed on student-athletes, and the visibility of student-athletes on campus. The findings showed that faculty tend to have more positive perceptions when they better understand the challenges student-athletes face and when they interact with them in academic settings. Interestingly, the study also found that female student-athletes and those on smaller, non-

revenue-generating teams were often viewed more positively than their male or high-profile team counterparts. This research highlights the importance of communication and collaboration between faculty and student-athletes to promote academic support and mutual understanding.

CSA FACULTY PRESENT AT INTERNATIONAL SYMPOSIUM IN BEIJING


