## Steven Dollahan CEPS Rising Star

Steven is an elementary special education inclusion teacher for grades K-5 in Frankfort, Indiana. In addition to teaching, Steven is the Community Schools of Frankfort district cotrainer for use of force, restraint, and seclusion procedures in the student restraint program.

Prior to working at the elementary level, Steven was a secondary level special education teacher at Frankfort Middle School. Steven began his career at a residential school in Carmel, Indiana



for at-risk youth from across the country, helping them find greater independence and gain emotional and behavioral control. He became a leading advocate for these students, assisting several into independent living arrangements outside of the residential setting and developing training modules for related support staff.

During his transition to public education, he remained active in the residential setting by creating Interstate Compact Agreements, continuing advocacy of students for various child serving state agencies, and compliance monitoring of student rights and educational programs.

Steve came to Florida State from Indiana State University where he served as the Director of Athletic Academic Services for four years.

He was the first EIU student to receive the National Athletic Trainers Association Undergraduate Scholarship. Brian became a certified athletic trainer in 1981. He taught health education, physical education, and sports medicine courses at Wheeling High School for 23 years.



While providing athletic training services at Wheeling High School, Brian was a charter member of the Illinois High School Association's Sports Medicine Advisory Committee. He participated in the Illinois Department of Professional and Financial Regulation Athletic Training Licensure Board where he served as Vice Chair. Brian served on the Illinois Athletic Trainers Association Board of Directors and was inducted into their Hall of Fame in 1998.

Brian became the Division Head for Health Education, Physical Education, and Driver Education at Wheeling High School in 2003. As division head, the Physical Education program received the Blue Ribbon Award from IAHPERD. Brian became the associate principal of operations in 2007 and served until 2010. Brian currently serves as director of operations for Township High School District 214. In the past three years, he has planned and supervised over 50 million dollars in school improvements.

### James Basham Leadership & Service



Dr. James (Jamie) Basham is an Assistant Professor at the University of Kansas in the Department of Special Education. He proudly received his bachelor's and master's degrees in special education from Eastern Illinois University in 1994 and 1996 respectively and earned his Ph.D. from the University of Illinois.

Dr. Basham's research is focused on student learning and cognition in modern learning environments chiefly related to instructional

design and technology. Much of his work concentrates on the application of Universal Design for Learning (UDL) and Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics (STEM) education.

Since 2006, he has successfully obtained over \$12 million in research and development funding from state entities, federal agencies, and private foundations, much of which is focused on the research and development of new software systems for supporting the application of UDL within the learning environment. He is also a Co-Principal Investigator in the *Center on Online Learning and Students with Disabilities (COLSD)*, which is investigating the trends and effects on online learning in K-12 education, especially for students with disabilities.

He serves on the editorial board for the Journal of Special Education Technology (JSET) as well as Remedial and Special Education (RASE). Dr. Basham was also a recent co-guest editor for the JSET topical issue on STEM education for individuals with disabilities and diverse learning needs. This was the first publication that focused on STEM education and individuals with disabilities. Dr. Basham is the co-founder of the UDL-Implementation Research Network (UDL-IRN) and is the current President of the International Society for Technology in Education (ISTE) Special Education Technology Special Interest Group (SETSIG).

### Richard Bowman Lifetime Achievement

Richard Bowman currently serves as the Head coach of Women's Track and Field and Cross Country at Cornell University, Ithaca, New York. During his 32 year career at Cornell, he directed athletes to over 150 lvy League and Heptagonal conference championships.

Currently 45 school records are held by athletes he has coached, while 28 women's teams have won lvy League conference titles during his tenure. He



was voted the Northeast Region Outdoor Division 1 NCAA Coach of the Year for the 2012 season.

Three of his athletes have entered Cornell's prestigious Hall of Fame. He coached Olympian Curt Hampstead (110 hurdles), former Trinidad national champion Michael Saunders, Lauren Kulik, a two-time ECAC triple jump champion and three lvy League Track and Field MVP's. Rich coached Jamie Greubel to an lvy League best in the heptathlon and a berth at the NCAA championships; she currently drives bobsled for the US Olympic team.


