- <u>Chapter Summary (10 points)</u>: Students will read a chapter from the Barlow text and provide a one page written summary.
- <u>Case Summary/Presentation (25) and Analysis (25)</u>: A) <u>Case Summary Presentation</u>: Students will develop a written case summary/assessment, a diagnosis, and a treatment plan of one of their clients. Students will acquire client permission and provide a 15 minute taped portion of a counseling session to be played in class. Students will develop a written transcript with analysis of the session for all class members and present the case in class. B) <u>Analysis</u>: Students will transcribe a 15 minute portion of this session and analyze each counselor statement.
- <u>Summative Paper: (10 Points)</u>: Students will type a 608 page summative evaluation of their internship experience.
- <u>University Supervision and Evaluation (20 points)</u>: Students' evaluation is based on their ability to demonstrate use of the core counseling skills and familiarity with at least four theories or methods of counseling.
- <u>Site Supervision & Evaluation (10 points)</u>: Students will be evaluated by the on-campus professor/supervisor in consultation with the on-site supervisor. Students will review at least six taped client sessions with their on-site agency supervisor. In addition a mid-term and a final evaluation form will be sent to the on-site supervisor. Students will be expected to demonstrate effective use of core counseling skills throughout their internship experience.

- <u>Total Hours</u>: Students will submit log of Service Hours. This log will include all indirect and direct hours and include total hours worked and be submitted for successful completion of the course.
