Proposed Revision to B.S. in Health Promotion: Community Health Option

Effective Date: Fall 2018

Rationale: Based on a systematic review of the curriculum, student performance in the upper division courses, and the emerging need for online degree completion options, the following changes have been made:

- 1. HST 2900: Human Diseases has been added to the required core courses. Human Diseases builds on the overview foundation established in HST 2000: Human Health by delving into more detailed information about the diseases which affect human beings. Students who have taken HST 2900 are better prepared for HST 3765: Epidemiology, which is a required core course, so adding HST 2900 to the required core creates a stronger base for the upper division courses.
- 2. The option to take EITHER BIO 2001G: Human Physiology OR both BIO 2210 & Bio 2220 [Anatomy and Physiology I & II] has been added to the core. Students have been required to take Bio 2001G since the major was created. An increasing number of students are coming from a clinical background, or headed to a clinical prep program. These students have either already completed the A&P sequence, or will as part of their required admission prerequisites. Since the entire content of Bio 2001G is covered within the two semester A&P sequence, we currently submit course substitution waivers for every student who has completed the A&P sequence. Our academic advisor estimates that is at least 20% of our students. Given how many students are affected, it seems logical to simply add the language allowing this substitution to the approved curriculum.
- 3. The number of elective hours in the major has been decreased from 12 to 9 to maintain the overall total number of hours in the major at 58.
- 4. HST 2900 has been removed from the elective list, as it is now in the required core.
- 5. HST 2600: International Health has been removed from the elective list. HST 2600 has not been taught for several years. The faculty person who originally designed and taught the course retired in 2004, and none of the current faculty have expertise or particular interest in the subject matter.
- 6. HCM 2910: Introduction to Health Communication has been added to the elective list, in keeping with our commitment to the Health Communication curriculum.
- 7. NUR 3203: Medical Terminology has been added to the elective list. Many of our students go on into clinical professions after graduating from EIU. Being able to take this course as part of their undergraduate program is advantageous to them as it is a prerequisite course for admission to many clinical programs. The Nursing Department supports this addition to our curriculum.
- 8. FLS 1112: Spanish for the Health Professional has been added to the elective list. The opportunity to take a course which addresses the vocabulary, culture, and context of Spanish-speaking individuals in the health care context is invaluable, and not readily available south of Chicago. The Foreign Language Department supports this addition to our curriculum.
