#### Program Revision: History with Teacher Licensure

There are two driving forces to revise and completely overhaul the Social Science Teaching program/curriculum. History with Teacher Licensure is the larger degree program in the program; the other option is Social Science Teaching which allows students to concentrate in Geography, Political Science, Psychology, or Sociology-Anthropology. (Similar revisions to Social Science Teaching (SOS) will be submitted in the near future.) The first reason for the program revision is the sheer size: the smallest of our programs, SOS-PLS, stands at 134 hours, while two others, SOS-SOC and HIS-TL, stand at 140 hours. This is blocking recruitment and costing our current students a lot of money that might be better spent towards gathering additional endorsements or minors. It also stands in the way of students who would like to complete departmental honors. The second, and equally important, reason is a series of curricular changes and resulting state and accreditation mandates. Illinois has adopted new Social Studies standards, now in rule-making, and these are dramatically different than the former Illinois Learning Standards. The state will be dropping the Core Standards for educators in favor of National Council for the Social Studies accrediting standards, currently in revision. Additionally, current state content test frameworks still guide us (although they will also be changing in the next 3-5 years). Coordinator of Social Science Teaching, Bonnie Laughlin-Schultz, created a report for the Social Science Teaching program that outlines all of these elements, available upon request to your committees and departments. The name of History with Teacher Licensure will remain the name but for the sake of clarity and recruitment, the name will formally change from "Social Science Studies" to "Social Studies Teaching." This allows incoming and prospective students to more easily identify the program as applying to them. Revisions to History with Teacher Licensure and Social Science Studies are being submitted separately. The main changes are to the Social Studies Teaching Core, those courses required for licensure of all concentrations. Each department has also revised the courses in its concentration to better align with curriculum mandates, conform to scheduling, and/or to allow more choice to majors.

# History with Teacher Licensure Option (B.A.)

#### Total Semester Hours required for the Degree: 127 134 semester hours

## Semester Hours required for the History with Teacher Licensure Option: 78 67 semester hours

The History with Teacher Licensure Option is for students who would like to major in History and gain Illinois state licensure at the secondary level to teach all of the social sciences (history, economics, geography, political science, psychology and sociology/anthropology). Students must receive a grade of "C" or higher in all courses which apply to the major and must maintain a major grade point average of 3.0 or higher and a cumulative grade point average of 2.75 or higher to complete the program. For students also wanting to be eligible to teach middle school history, additional Middle Level Education courses are required.

This option requires that students follow and meet the requirements for Admission, Retention and Graduation from Teacher Licensure programs as described in the "Teacher Licensure Programs" section of this catalog and as explained at the University Admission to Teacher Education Meeting which all students must attend. Students must gain University Approval to Take Teacher Education Courses no later than the end of their first semester Junior year in order to use this suggested plan. All students must pass the Illinois Licensure Test of Academic Proficiency or document a composite score of 22 or higher, with combined English/Writing score of 19, on the ACT plus Writing for selection into teacher education and should complete this requirement no later than their sophomore year. Students must complete the professional education coursework following the Regular Secondary Education Professional Education Sequence. Information is available in the Teacher Licensure Program section of this catalog. Students must pass the appropriate test (whether it be APT, edTPA, or some other test) before they can receive their teaching license from Illinois or any other state.

Students must receive a "C" or better in all courses used toward graduation, regardless of where they are taken. This includes general education, professional education, major and minor course, all university required courses, and electives. Students must maintain a minimum cumulative and major GPA of 2.65 in order to continue in the education program. Students must receive a "C" or better in all coursework, and maintain a minimum cumulative GPA of 2.75 and major GPA of 3.00, in order to be approved for student teaching. Approval for student teaching requires that the minimum GPA be held at the beginning of the semester prior to the student-teaching semester. Students must also pass the requisite state content test in order for student teaching approval.

Students must complete the professional education coursework following the Regular Secondary Education Professional Education Sequence. Information is available in the Teacher Licensure Program section of this catalog.

Students must pass the appropriate Assessment of Professional Teaching (APT) test before they can receive their teaching license from Illinois or any other state.
