Proposed program revision: Master of Arts in Music, Music Education Concentration

The current Master of Arts in Music, Music Education Concentration provides a truly hybrid course of study. Courses are taught on campus during three 6-week summer terms and on-line during the spring and fall semesters. However, in an effort to attract more students to our program, we would like to move the summer courses to primarily online and require a single week of residency during one summer. We believe we can maintain the excellent quality of the courses and instruction, and at the same time build a sustainable, flexible, and competitive program.

As part of this program change, four courses require revision for online or hybrid instruction: MUS 5101 (Research Methods), MUS 5702 (Graduate Seminar in Music Education), MUS 5705 (Music Curriculum and Assessment), and MUS 4980 (Workshop in Music). In addition, MUS 5950 (Thesis) will be eliminated from the program. Instead, student work will culminate in a committee reviewed Capstone Project (new course, MUS 5900). These changes in the concentration eliminate the need for a strict sequence, and will allow for increased flexibility in both timeline and enrollment.

The one-week residency on campus provides the students in the program opportunity to connect with each other and the instructors. Both the Graduate Seminar and the Workshop in Music depart from the typical online course sequence. In the Graduate Seminar students will discuss contemporary topics. The hybrid Workshop in Music requires both an academic component as well as hands on application during residency. It can cover varied topics such as improvisation, conducting, and arranging.
