Reflections (10%) – written responses and reflections on course readings, activities, and content.

The EIU-approved online learning management system will be used to provide a sound virtual learning environment for students enrolled in an online section of this course. Students will be required to regularly post their reflections, views, their own individual experiences relevant to each of the topics on cultural differences as indicated in PART III: OUTLINE OF THE COURSE. Online discussion/participation and on-line learning communities will be used for shared facilitation/learning; e-lecture notes and study summaries will be used to facilitate content learning. Online discussion/participation, students' writing samples and exams will be used to assess students' achievement of the specified learning objectives.

- b. Describe how the integrity of student work will be assured:**

Emphasizing the importance of ethical codes and behavior in academic activities in the syllabus and communications with students; teaching students how to cite others' work; closely monitoring students' work such as writing styles, and content; privately communicating with students for concerns; using technology functions such as timed and randomized tests, and the post-before-view feature. The integrity of student writing will be assured through the use of EIU-approved anti-plagiarism software. This software will help assure original authorship of writing samples submitted by students.

- c. Describe provisions for and requirements of instructor-student and student-student interaction, including the kinds of technologies that will be used to support the interaction (e.g., e-mail, web-based discussions, computer conferences, etc.):**

Regular interaction between student and instructor will be maintained through the use of EIU e-mail and the online learning management system's mail tool. A percentage of the course grade is used to promote student-student and teacher-student interactions. Students' class participation—consistent interactions with classmates and the instructor both qualitatively and quantitatively will be a major evaluation factor. Email, online-chat and web-based discussions are also used to promote the aforementioned interactions.

*In **writing-active courses**, frequent, brief writing activities and assignments are required. Such activities -- some of which are to be graded -- might include five-minute in-class writing assignments, journal keeping, lab reports, essay examinations, short papers, longer papers, or a variety of other writing-to-learn activities of the instructor's invention. Writing assignments and activities in writing-active courses are designed primarily to assist students in mastering course content, secondarily to strengthen students' writing skills. In **writing-intensive courses**, several writing assignments and writing activities are required. These assignments and activities, which are to be spread over the course of the semester, serve the dual purpose of strengthening writing skills and deepening understanding of course content. At least one writing assignment is to be revised by the student after it has been read and commented on by the instructor. In writing-intensive courses, students' writing should constitute no less than 35% of the final course grade. In **writing-centered courses** (English 1001G, English 1002G, and their honors equivalents), students learn the principles and the process of writing in all of its stages, from inception to completion. The quality of students' writing is the principal determinant of the course grade. The minimum writing requirement is 20 pages (5,000 words).
