1. Catalog Description

- a. Course Number: FLG 2202G
- b. Course Title: Intermediate German II
- c. Meeting Times & Credit: 4-0-4
- d. Terms to be Offered: F, S
- e. Short Title: Inter Ger II
- f. Catalog Description: Review of grammar, practice in conversation and composition, reading of selected materials. No more than four years of high school German allowed without permission of Department Chair.
- g. Prerequisites: Must have successfully completed FLG 2201G or three years of high school German language or a course articulated as equivalent to FLG 2201G.
- h. This course is writing-intensive.

2. Objectives of the Course: Students shall

- a. achieve a proficiency level of Novice-high in speaking, reading, listening and writing.
- b. be able to read basic German texts.
- c. be familiar with selected major figures in German literature, art, politics and pop culture.
- d. be familiar with German web sites.
- e. have knowledge of the German attitude toward Germany's role in WWII.
- f. be familiar with Germany's economy, its relationship to the US and Germany's role in the European Union

4. Evaluation of Student Learning:

a. Final grades will be calculated in the following manner:

- b. This course is writing intensive in that students will be required to work consistently toward an ability to sustain written discourse in German. As a result, there will be numerous short compositions written throughout the course which will be commented on by the instructor, evaluated for grammar, style and content and which the students will be required to revise. All exams and most quizzes will incorporate short essay questions as well. More than 35% of the final grade will be based on written elements.

5. Rationale:

- a. This course will be placed under the Humanities and Fine Arts segment of the General Education Curriculum. The course meets the requirements of that segment by exploring the rich linguistic, artistic, musical and literary worlds of German-speaking lands through practical application of original materials from these lands.
- b. The 2000 level of the course indicates its intermediate placement in a sequential series. Prerequisite for the course is 2201 or three years of high school German.
- c. Although there are parallel courses in French and Spanish, there is no similarity to other German courses.
- d. Foreign Languages majors or minors may use this course to complete the required number of hours either as part of the German concentration or the second or third language requirement depending on the course selection chosen.

6. Implementation:

- a. Course will be assigned initially to Herb Breidenbach, Shelley French, or Karl Konrad

- c. There is no additional cost to students.
