

## English Language Arts Program with Departmental Honors Potential Course Sequences<sup>1</sup>

Are you an English Language Arts major looking to add Departmental Honors? You've come to the right place! The potential course sequences located below provide useful scheduling advice that will allow you to streamline your English, Education, & Honors coursework. Keep in mind that these are only guides. Your first step should be to **schedule an appointment to meet with your advisor to review your completed and anticipated course work** to determine how best to fit Departmental Honors into your studies.

## I. Native Student – Accelerated 4-Year Sequence

**Note:** This possible course sequence could allow students to finish all course work, including requirements for departmental honors and to student teach in eight semesters. However, it requires carrying heavier than normal course loads, which it is not always ideal. As with all of the potential sequences mapped out here, course availabilities may require deviating from this planned path. Note, courses fulfilling departmental honors are highlighted in yellow with further options for waivers discussed in the footnotes.

<sup>2</sup> We would recommend students take ENG 2011G as one of their general education Humanities courses at this point if an advisor/chair will allow ENG 1002 to be taken con-currently. If not, this class would be recommended for a general education course taken during the Sophomore year.

<sup>3</sup> ENG 3705 is often offered online during the Summer. For students wishing to complete online course work, we would recommend taking ENG 3705 the summer prior to Junior year and fulfilling other required courses from heavier semesters in its spot.

<sup>4</sup> This course can double-count for General Education (Social-Behavioral) and Diversity Requirements.

<sup>5</sup> Students seeking Departmental Honors must take one Honors English Course. Since a genre studies course is required of ELA students, ENG 3892 (Honors Shakespeare) is the recommended course to take to fulfill this requirement. Other options would be to take ENG 2099, ENG 2091, or ENG 3099G (Honors Myth & Culture) as one of the English Electives.

<sup>6</sup> Note: This course was previously numbered EDP 3331 and was part of the practicum pairing.

For content area mastery, prior to ENG 3401 it is useful to have taken ENG 2901 and prior to ENG 3402 it is useful to have taken ENG 3705 (or another multicultural literature course) and ENG 4903.

<sup>9</sup> This course is recommended, not required. This course is regularly offered during the summer sessions.

<sup>10</sup> It is recommended that students complete (or enroll concurrently in) ENG 3008 prior to taking this course.

<sup>12</sup> This sequence has ENG 4444 (Independent Study) taking the place of one English Elective. Alternately, if the topic of the independent study fulfills a Pre/Post-1800 Literature course or the second required Multicultural Literature Course ENG 4444 can be waived to fulfill those requirements.

<sup>14</sup> Students must take at least one departmental methods course prior to enrolling in SED 3330 (Practicum).

<sup>15</sup> This course requires junior standing and is offered online every semester including summer.

<sup>16</sup> This course is offered every summer on campus and online and could be completed prior to this semester.

<sup>17</sup> A student planning to take departmental honors can substitute ENG 4644 (Honors Thesis) for ENG 3001 as both writing-centered courses.

<sup>18</sup> Taking a graduate level seminar course is a requirement of departmental honors. Each semester a pre/post-1800 Literature course is available so this would be a logical way to fulfill the ELA and Honors requirements.

## II. Native Student – Recommended 4-Year (Plus Student Teaching) Sequence

Note: This possible course sequence could allow students to finish all course work, including requirements for departmental honors, and to student teach in nine semesters. As with all of the potential sequences mapped out here, course availabilities may require deviating from this planned path.<sup>19</sup> Note, courses fulfilling departmental honors are highlighted in yellow with further options for waivers discussed in the footnotes.

<sup>22</sup> We would recommend students take ENG 2011G as one of their general education Humanities courses during their Sophomore year for additional genre studies training.

<sup>23</sup> Note: This course was previously numbered EDP 3331 and was part of the practicum pairing.

<sup>24</sup> It is recommended that students pass the TAP exam (or submit equivalent ACT scores) prior to enrolling in any methods course. For content area mastery, prior to ENG 3401 it is useful to have taken ENG 2901 and prior to ENG 3402 it is useful to have taken ENG 3705 (or another multicultural literature course) and ENG 4903.

### III. Accelerated Transfer Sequence<sup>36</sup>

**Note:** This possible course sequence could allow transfer students to finish all course work, including requirements for departmental honors, and to student teach in five semesters. This path assumes that students have completed all general education requirements at their previous institution. Should additional courses be needed, they would need to be planned into the students' studies accordingly. However, it requires carrying heavier than normal course loads, which it is not always ideal. As with all of the potential sequences mapped out here, course availabilities may require deviating from this planned path. Note, courses fulfilling departmental honors are highlighted in yellow with further options for waivers discussed in the footnotes.

#### IV. Accelerated Transfer Sequence, including Summer Coursework<sup>52</sup>

**Note:** This possible course sequence could allow transfer students to finish all course work, including requirements for departmental honors, and to student teach in two and a half years but requires summer coursework to make the Fall/Spring course loads more manageable. All of the recommended summer courses are offered online to accommodate students who must reside off campus during the summer months. This path assumes that students have completed all general education requirements at their previous institution. Should additional courses be needed, they would need to be planned into the students' studies accordingly. However, it requires carrying heavier than normal course loads, which it is not always ideal. As with all of the potential sequences mapped out here, course availabilities may require deviating from this planned path. Note, courses fulfilling departmental honors are highlighted in yellow with further options for waivers discussed in the footnotes.

Note, courses fulfilling departmental honors are highlighted in yellow with further options for waivers discussed in the footnotes.
