Renewable Energy Center opens to the public

On October 7th, 2011 the Renewable Energy Center had its ribbon cutting ceremony. Nearly 1,000 people were in attendance and approximately 350 tours were given in the course of just over 2 hours. In attendance were several dignitaries including Representative Chappin Rose, Senator Dale Righter, Executive Director of the Illinois Environmental Protection

Agency, President for Honeywell Energy Solutions Group, and Director of the United States Department of Commerce Economic Development Administration. There were many congratulations to be given for all parties involved and we certainly thank all those that made the plant possible and shining that beautiful day. The Renewable Energy Center

is now providing all the steam to campus and is anticipated to begin electrical generation in the near future. The steam turbine in the plant is slated to produce nearly 10% of the University's electricity demand.

CMMS - just what does it mean?

A Computerized Maintenance Management System is a computer program that allows you to track the maintenance issues organized in one place. July we went live with an updated version of our CMMS. The name of the CMMS is MicroMain Facilligence. The system is completely web driven. Meaning all you need is a web browser like Firefox or Internet Explorer to access the maintenance information.

on each work order. Preventive maintenance can be schedule and maintenance to stop problems before they can happen.

Central Stores uses the CMMS to track part and part information. All of our part information is in the CMMS. Part quantity manufactures, descriptions, and reorder points help organize and track the parts. Central Stores can track the life of the parts in their warehouses. Every purchase and every issue is tracked and accounted for.

Being a web driven system it makes it very easy for us to open up critical information for our customers. For example when a WO is created an email

goes out to the requestor so they track the progress of the request. They can know when the work order was printed and when the work order is complete.

Starting in November work control will be opening up the request module to customers. Meaning high volume customers can submit and request work directly in the CMMS themselves. They simply go to our website and enter in the work they need.

The CMMS is the nervous system of the maintenance shops. We have just started and the system looks very promising.

As usual, donations can be given directly to any of the committee members, Mike Carter, Chris Childress or Deb Black. Or if


you wish for your donations to remain anonymous, the Christmas box is available on Cathy Gray's desk and will also be at the FPM annual Christmas lunch.
