Determination of the Functional Significance of Glutamate Carboxypeptidase II in Folate Metabolism in Caenorhabditis elegans

Glutamate Carboxypeptidase II (GCPII) is a transmembrane metalloprotease produced in many human tissues and many other organisms. One function of GCPII is the transformation of dietary folate to allow its absorption across the intestinal membrane. Folate is a cofactor in the biosynthesis of DNA, RNA, amino acids, and in many other cellular growth and reproduction pathways. Folate cannot be synthesized in higher organisms therefore must be taken through diet and the specific roles of GCPII in this process remain under explored. The goal of this research is to characterize the functional roles of GCPII in folate metabolism and the overall effect of GCPII on the reproductive and physiological biochemistry using the model organism, Caenorhabditis elegans. C. elegans GCPII is produced as three paralogs: gcp-2.1, gcp-2.2, and gcp-2.3, which are similar in structure to the five paralogs of human GCPII. The main hypothesis is that each GCPII paralog has unique, tissue-specific functional role/s. Sulfamethoxazole mediated folate-limited E. coli OP50, the food source for C. elegans, was fed to the wild type, gcp-2.1, gcp-2.2, and gcp-2.3 null mutant strains. Alternatively, the same C. elegans strains were fed the sulfamethoxazole treated OP50 that was supplemented with the folate derivative tetrahydrofolate. Under these conditions, both brood size and longevity were measured to assess the effect of GCPII on folate metabolism and folate mediated reproductive and physiological effects. Additionally, HPLC based folate derivative assessment of the food source was conducted to identify different folate forms. Tetrahydrofolate, dihydrofolate, and folinic acid were present in untreated OP50 but none were detected in SMX treated OP50. Altogether, the results showed that median longevity of the GCPII paralogs increased relative to the wild type and tetrahydrofolate supplementation restored reproduction in all strains at different levels.

Debt, Deregulation, and Death: Neoliberalism, Human Rights, and American-Argentine Relations, 1976-1983

Between 1976 and 1983, Argentina was governed by a military government that oversaw both a brutal campaign against communism and a process of neoliberalization. During this period, the United States provided substantial economic support to Argentina through



its approval of loans that enabled Argentina's economic transformation. Early on, the United States was largely apathetic and complacent in regard to Argentina's Dirty War. During the administration of Jimmy Carter, the United States attempted to confront the Argentine military government about its human rights abuses. However, a substantial contingent within the Carter administration pushed back against this initiative and worked to protect American influence within Argentina. This led to the human rights initiative to be an institutional failure. Meanwhile, the neoliberal economic policies of the Argentine military government, which were supported by the United States, initially provided substantial success for the wealthiest Argentines at the cost of the lowest classes within Argentina. This economic success was ultimately short lived, and the Argentine economy was left in a worse state by the time democracy returned in 1983. American-Argentine relations during this period left behind a legacy of failure and complacency, if not apathy, toward human rights abuses.

Examination of the Integration of Augmented Reality in Technology in Science Curriculum

This study examines students' success rate and level of engagement in a science classroom by using augmented reality (AR) specifically merge cube technology devices. Students' success rate is measured by their grades, which was the standard measure for students' understanding already in place. Engagement is measured by observing whether or not the students are asking questions, volunteering information, working well with others, paying attention in class, and participating actively in discussions. Two research questions guided the study: 1. Does the use of a merge cube in the science classroom improve participants' success rate (grade) in science? and 2. Does using a merge cube increase engagement between genders? Quantitative data was collected from students' grades before and after using a merge cube, while qualitative data was collected from observing how students engage in their learning when using the merge cube and when not using the merge cube. The data revealed that the total number of participants who earned a C or higher on the final chapter test was equal (31) whether the merge cube technology was implemented or not. Even though the number of participants earning an A after using the merge cube decreased, using the merge cube helped improve participants' engagement rate. Although females were more engaged in their learning when using the merge cube, males also showed improvement by having 18 more males with increased engagement. Females increased overall in their level of engagement with complete participation and attendance during class sessions.

Waist Circumference and the Relation to Aerobic Exercise and Perception of Illness in Adults with Type 2 Diabetes Mellitus

The purpose of this study was to observe the relationship between waist circumference (WC), amount of aerobic exercise performed weekly and overall Health Belief Model (HBM) score

in adults with diagnosed type 2 diabetes mellitus (T2DM). Members from a local Midwest adult fitness program (n = 5) who had been diagnosed T2DM participated in this study. Participants ranged in age from 70 to 80 years with an average age of 74 years. Four of the participants were female and one participant was male. The questions included in this study were 1.) in those with diagnosed T2DM, was a low overall HBM score correlated with a high WC? and 2.) was there a relationship between the overall HBM score and whether individuals with diagnosed T2DM met American College of Sports Medicine's (ACSM's) guidelines for aerobic exercise? WC measurements were taken by the primary researcher and the type and amount of aerobic exercise participants completed was documented as part of the demographic survey. Participants' perception of illness was analyzed using a version of the Health Belief Model, adapted from Gutierrez and Long (201 1). Analysis of the data was done by first calculating Cronbach's alpha to assess internal reliability of the HBM used. Both a Pearson's Correlation Coefficient r and a p-value were then calculated to test the first hypothesis, yielding values of r = 0.09 and p = 0.89, respectively. These results both showed a nonsignificant relationship between WC measurement and the overall HBM score in this sample of adults with diagnosed T2DM. Similarly, the second hypothesis was assessed by both a Pearson's Correlation Coefficient r and a p-value, yielding values of r = 0.36 and p = 0.55, respectively. These results showed a non-significant relationship between the overall HBM score and whether participants met ACSM's guidelines for aerobic exercise. Overall, the results of this study did not support either hypothesis, indicating no observed relationship between WC measurements and overall HBM score or between overall HBM score and whether individuals met ACSM's guidelines for aerobic exercise. It is recommended that future studies use a larger population in order to obtain a larger sample size, hopefully yielding more significant results. Additionally, it is recommended that future studies sample from multiple facilities and more diverse populations in order to increase the variation in age range and duration of diagnosis among participants.

Identifying Scotomata in Hazard Identification Caused by Ignorance and Overconfidence

The manufacturing and construction industries are two of the most dangerous professions, and employees are frequently exposed to hazards and hazardous conditions which can lead to serious injury or even death. An observed phenomenon, frequently called the Dunning-



Kruger Effect states that unskilled people are often unaware of their shortcomings and those with the higher-level skills often underestimate their abilities. This study examines employees' training, years of experience, and performance to gauge any correlations among these variables in the area of hazard awareness. The goal of this study is to help individuals to recognize blind spots in their knowledge to identify hazards in various situations to keep themselves and others safe.

King-Mertz Research / Creative Activity Awards

Nancie King Mertz, '77 graduate alumna from the program in Art, established the King-Mertz Research/Creative Activity Awards in 2010 to recognize the highest achievement in graduate research based on non-thesis graduate research/creative activity projects. Phase Change Thermal Storage: Cooking with more Power and Versatility

A 100 W solar panel directly powering an Insulated Solar Electric Cooker (ISEC) can slowly cook 5 kg of food over the course of a day. However, 0.4 kWh of the day's energy can be stored in 2.5 kg of erythritol phase change material, allowing ISEC to cook more rapidly, as well as cook after sunset. We control supercooling by forcing crystallization, making erythritol an ideal thermal storage material for cooking and other thermal-storage processes, but the erythritol degrades in quality when cycled for several months over 180 °C. The efficiency of thermal storage is comparable to that of more expensive systems using battery storage and induction cooktops. ISECs can be built in low-income communities, and the best design varies depending on availability of materials, access to building technologies, and local preferences. A Global Learning Community of researchers, funding agencies, nonprofits, student groups, and local enterprises is collaboratively developing the open source technology with partners in low income communities to optimize designs, construction, and dissemination.

Being Civil in East Berlin: Media Representation of the American Civil Rights Movement in the German Democratic Republic, 1963

This paper examines newspaper coverage of the March on Washington in 1963 in the socialist German Democratic Republic (GDR, or East Germany). The paper makes a significant contribution to the literature on the history of human rights, the transnational history of the American civil rights movement, and the history of twentieth century Germany. As a history of human rights, this research expands upon studies that describe the ways in which the GDR presented itself a champion of global human rights (even as it suppressed rights at home). While other scholars have examined the GDR's public criticism of American race relations, this research explores the media's representations of the March on Washington and the events that preceded it. Research findings demonstrate how the three newspapers with the largest circulation in East Germany framed American racism in terms of the official Marxist-Leninist ideology spillover of technology and expertise.

The Economic and Social Determinance of Electrification Rate; Empirical Evidence from Sudan

The objective of this study is to investigate the relationship between electrification rate as the dependent variable and natural resources rent, general government final consumption expenditure, GDP, GDP per capita, population growth, and power consumption in Sudan for the period between 1990-2014. The aim of the study is to explore factors that are impacting Sudan's total electricity access. A quantitative method using the Ordinary Least Square (OLS) Regression analysis testing approach was applied to study the significance of the relationship between the dependent and independent variables. The results revealed that there is an insignificant relationship between the variables in the study. The study is indicating that variables outside the scope of the study are probably impacting the electrification rate in Sudan.

The Impact of Teaching Soft Skills on the Ability Levels of 12th Grade Students

The purpose of this study was to find out if teaching certain specific soft skills (leadership, communication, and teamwork) increase students' ability levels in those areas. The study used a mixed methods design. It was hypothesized that being specifically taught about and given chances to practice leadership, communication, and teamwork would increase students' skill levels in those areas. The research question that guided the study was as follows: Does specific teaching about certain soft skills (leadership, communication, and teamwork) increase students' ability levels in those areas? Eighteen 12th grade students from two classes, ages 17 and 18, participated in the study for six weeks. Participants rated themselves on three skills (leadership, communication, and teamwork) at the beginning and end of the study. The researcher also rated participants on those skills at the beginning and end of the study. The participants completed a pre- and post- open-ended survey about the three soft skills. In addition, the researcher also used an observation checklist to monitor behaviors of the soft skills during the six weeks of the study. Each of the three skills showed gains when post scores were compared to pre scores. The study revealed that communication in particular showed the highest gains (student rating, increase of 0.61; teacher rating, increase of 1.5; and observation, increase of 1.28), followed by teamwork and leadership.


During my 10-week internship, I co-planned and co-implemented a variety of life enrichment opportunities for older adults. Examples include reading the newspaper to residents with

vision difficulties, interaction with games of interest, and inviting residents to teach me new activities that were nostalgic and valued to them. We engaged in music enrichment activities, brain-stimulation exercises, and social events on holiday and special occasions. The enrichment through human connection is of primary value and importance, no matter the activity. Sometimes, simply taking the time to go on a walk with a resident provides the most enriching moment of that person's day. I learned from and contributed to residents and the Carriage Crossing site in a variety of ways. First, I appreciated being able to get to know and spend time with the residents; forming these relationships solidified my career goals and enthusiasm for working with the older adult population. Second, I was able to observe firsthand the impact life enrichment has on the residents in a living community for older adults. Finally, this internship opportunity allowed me to learn the interdependencies and holistic connectedness of all departments in a residential setting for older adults. These learning experiences allowed me to apply research and best practices from my graduate coursework. The many reviews of the literature, written research papers, and course presentations completed for my courses came to life in the form of professional and person-centered care, interactions, and contributions during my internship experience at Carriage Crossing.

An accomplished and award-winning student athlete, she applies her passion for healthy living in her research and in her graduate assistantship. As a GA for the Health Education Resource Center, Lindsey served as the Health Communication and Marketing Coordinator. In addition to her duties for that role she accepted the offer to mentor students in a professional writing course where she assisted them in producing health-related posters, blog posts, and other health education and writing related tasks. She also volunteered to mentor undergraduate students interested in pursuing graduate studies in nutrition and dietetics through the Graduate Network for Undergraduates. Lindsey's research

includes the effect of nutrition education on adolescent consumption of sugar-sweetened beverages and cooling methods for athletes in hot temperatures. She partnered with a fellow nutrition and dietetics student to develop a program about proper hydration that incorporates goal setting, monitoring, follow up, and evaluation for the track and field athletes. Along with her excellence in scholarship, during her graduate studies she has also distinguished herself as one of the most outstanding student athletes in the history of Eastern Illinois University.
