This is a Political Science class that focuses on the political ideas that support Democratic institutions and help explain how American politics works. The central idea of a Democratic government is that every citizen is allowed to participate in the decision-making process (usually through voting) and the key question for the class is do we deserve the right to participate? How many people pay attention to politics and government? Will they make decisions that will be good for all?

We will read essays each week that discuss the way democracy should work and will have discussions that center on how close modern politics meets our political ideals.

We will draw on insights from neuroscience, psychology, and philosophy and consider some good old-fashioned grammar and rhetoric to help us hone our own powers of expression. Students can expect to discuss a wide range of readings in different disciplines and to participate in stimulating writing exercises, creative and practical.
