## History of the Illinois Section of the Mathematical Association of America

The Illinois Section of the MAA was founded in 1917, two years after the national Association was chartered. The Illinois Section is the tenth-oldest in the Association. The founding of the Illinois Section was reported the following year in the American Mathematical Monthly as follows:

### REPORT OF ORGANIZATION OF THE ILLINOIS SECTION.

At the call of Professor H. E. Slaught the following persons met in Room 38 of Ryerson Physical Laboratory, University of Chicago, at 4:30 P.M., on December 27, 1917, to discuss a plan for organizing an Illinois Section of the Mathematical Association of America: I.A. Barnett, G. A. Bliss, H.E. Cobb, C.E. Comstock, M.W. Coultrap, A.R. Crathorne, D.R. Curtiss, A. Emch, J.A. Foberg, J.O. Hassler, Miss Nelle Ingels, E.B. Lytle, M. McNeill, H.L. Olson, H.L. Rietz, Mr. Scheibler, J.B. Shaw, C.H. Sisam, E.J. Townsend, and E.J. Wilczynski.

Mr. J.A. Foberg, of Crane Junior College, Chicago, was unanimously elected chairman of the meeting; he appointed Mr. E.B. Lytle secretary <sup>1</sup>. A motion of Professor Townsend that an Illinois Section be organized was unanimously adopted. Among other plans it was suggested but not determined that the meetings of this new Illinois Section be held at the time and place of the meetings of the Illinois Academy of Science. On motion of Professor Wilczynski the chairman was authorized to appoint four members who with the chairman shall constitute an executive committee with full power to arrange the time, place and program for the first meeting of the Illinois Section. In addition to the chairman, the members of this committee are: Nelle L. Ingels, Greenville College; C.E. Comstock, Bradley Polytechnic Institute; G.T. Sellew, Knox College; and L.S. Shively, Mount Morris College.

On motion of Professor Bliss the executive committee just formed was directed to appoint a committee of three to report at the first meeting and to present nominations for permanent officers of the Section.

The first program meeting of the Illinois Section was held in November 1919 on the campus of the University of Illinois. An account of this meeting was given in the *American Mathematical Monthly:* 

#### THE NOVEMBER MEETING OF THE ILLINOIS SECTION.

The first program meeting of the Illinois Section of the Mathematical Association of America was held in room 418 Natural History Building, University of Illinois, on November 22, 1919. There were fifty-nine persons present including the following twenty-four members of the Association: Blumberg, Camp, R. D. Carmichael, Coble, Comstock,

Crathorne, Emch, Foberg, Garlough, Kempner, Kustermann, Lytle, McNeill, Bessie I. Miller, G. A. Miller, Risley, Rosenbach, G. H. Scott, Shaw, Slaught, Steimley, E. L. Thompson, Townsend, and Wahlin.

The following program was given: (1) Address: H.E. Slaught, President of the Mathematical Association of America. (2) Round Table Discussion of the Topic: Freshman Mathematics as related to varying admission credits from the high schools. Discussion led by C.E. Comstock, Bradley Polytechnic Institute, M.W. Coultrap, Northwestern College, G.C. Heritage, Crane Junior College. (3) Address: The Training of Mathematics Teachers, E.B. Lytle, University of Illinois. Discussed by Malcolm McNeill, Lake Forest College, Bessie I. Miller, Rockford College, W.J. Risley, James Millikin University. (4) Address: How Mathematicians Work, Henry Blumberg, University of Illinois. (5) Business Meeting.

President Slaught sketched the history of mathematics teacher organizations in the United States leading up to the need and opportunities for service of this new Illinois Section. He made an appeal for the hearty cooperation of all college teachers of mathematics in Illinois.

Professor Comstock gave in detail the mathematics preparation of freshmen in Bradley Polytechnic Institute and some other Illinois colleges. He recommended better provision for students entering college with only one unit credit in high-school algebra, a more uniform standard for one unit in algebra, more attention to solid geometry in colleges, and less emphasis upon complicated symbolic manipulations. The general discussion of admission credits was lively and full of interest; all seemed to feel that algebra preparation was very unsatisfactory and numerous pleas for less formal work and more emphasis of general principles and methods were made.

By request, Dr. Lytle read his Ann Arbor address on the training of mathematics teachers; this address appears in full in the present number of the MONTHLY. The discussion put emphasis on the point of giving teachers more explicit training in the use of libraries, and on more independent preparation and forceful presentation of reports on special topics; Miss Miller offered a definite scheme for carrying out and grading such work.

Professor Blumberg described numerous methods of work, both humorous and serious, used by certain well-known mathematicians and concluded with a few generalizations on effective methods of work in the field of mathematics.

The old officers were reelected for one more year; Chairman, J.A. FOBERG, Crane Junior College, Secretary-Treasurer, E. B. LYTLE, University of Illinois, members of Executive Committee, C.E. COMSTOCK, Bradley Polytechnic Institute, G.T. SELLEW, Knox College, L.S. SHIVELY, Mount Morris College. The question of the place and time of the next meeting was discussed and finally referred to the Executive Committee with power.

At the close of the program a group took luncheon together at the Illinois Union building.

Other records of the founding and the subsequent work of the Illinois Section have been preserved. The following text is taken from a compilation of Section histories by Harriet F. Montague, who served on the Board of Governors of the MAA from 1961 to 1964.

Professor H.E. Slaught of the U. of Chicago was responsible for bringing together in December 1917 twenty-one persons interested in forming an Illinois Section. This organizational meeting was held during the Association meetings at the U. of Chicago. The first program meeting of the Section was held at the U. of Illinois on November 22, 1919. Twenty-four Association members were present with a total attendance of 59 persons. Professor Slaught, then President of the Association, gave the principle address, sketching the history of organizations of mathematics teachers in this country. He gave his views on the need and opportunities for the new Section, appealing for the hearty cooperation of all Coll. teachers of mathematics in Illinois. Other speakers discussed the training of mathematics teachers and freshman mathematics as related to varying admission requirements from the high schools. One other address was entitled "How Mathematicians Work." It is worth noting, in this day of expansion of the junior Coll. concept, that the first chairman of the Section was J.A. Foberg of Crane Junior Coll. [American Mathematical Monthly 27, 112 - 113].

The Illinois Section has shown through its history a lively interest in contemporary events. In the early years a study was made of the educational needs of young men in military service. All through the years there has been discussion and action with respect to identifying and encouraging students of mathematics. In 1948 it was proposed that students in the Chicago schoools be recognized through contests and awards. This first proposal was not implemented for lack of funds, but by 1953 the Section was engaged in promoting contests for high school students in Illinois. In 1957 the Section voted to have its contests become a part of the national program.

The adequate training of prospective teachers has received continued study by the Section. Cooperation with other state organizations and with the State Department of Education has been strong. Interest in special projects such as UICSM has been keen. Papers on the "Poorly Prepared Student," "Teaching Mathematics to Girls," "A Survey Course in Mathematics" show the range of concern for education in mathematics.

The Illinois Section has included some of the most distinguished mathematicians in the history of the Association. Among them are H.E. Slaught, President and later Honorary President of the Association, G.A. Bliss, author of the first Carus Monograph, Max Beberman, director of the UICSM, D.R. Curtiss, E.J. Moulton, Mayme Il Logsdon, Franz Hohn, R.D. Charmichael, and Lester R. Ford, Sr.

The mission of the MAA is to advance the mathematical sciences, especially at the collegiate level. Since its inception, the Illinois Section has worked to help the MAA meet its mission. Annual meetings of the Illinois Section play a major role in this enter-

prise. The following table documents the history of the Section's meetings, as available.
