### **David Commanday, Director**

Director of Orchestral Activities and Instructor of Applied Cello at Eastern Illinois University, Professor Commanday is also Artistic Director and Conductor of the Heartland Festival Orchestra, and an active guest conductor. His career combines international accomplishment as professional conductor, national prominence as a leader in the youth orchestra field, and distinction in the Academy of higher education. Among many awards received, the Illinois Council of Orchestras recognized Commanday as Illinois Professional Conductor of the Year.

Professor Commanday has a distinguished record of accomplishment with young musicians. As Music Director of the Boston Youth Symphony Orchestras, he received three ASCAP Awards for innovative programming of American music and for works he commissioned and premiered.

Professor Commanday is a cum laude graduate of Harvard College, and was awarded highest honors in his State Diploma of Orchestral Conducting at the University of Vienna. He has taught and conducted at Harvard, MIT, Boston University, Montclair University, Eureka College, and Bradley University, and was tenured Associate Professor on the faculty of Virginia Commonwealth University. At Eastern Illinois University he is the cellist of the Eastern Piano Trio with colleagues Shichao Zhang and Ji Myung Kim.





### **Dr. Shichao Zhang**

Dr. Shichao Zhang Pianist Shichao Zhang is an accomplished performer and educator who currently serves as the Director of the Keyboard Division and the Instructor of Piano at Eastern Illinois University, a position he has held since 2023. His career has spanned prestigious institutions, including the Bienen School of Music at Northwestern University as an Instructor, the Music Department of Skidmore College as a Visiting Artist-in-Residence, and Helongjiang University of Technology in China as a Visiting Professor.

Zhang has taught masterclasses and lessons at Euro Music Festival & Academy in Poland, Eastman School of Music, Ithaca College, East Tennessee State University, Morningside College, Wuhan Conservatory, and Tianjin Conservatory, among many others. His students have been accepted by prestigious schools and conservatories across the United States.

In addition to his teaching and performing commitments, Dr. Zhang proudly serves as the Festival Manager of the Amalfi Coast Music & Arts Festival in Italy and the Festival Coordinator of the Gijón International Piano Festival in Spain. These roles reflect his dedication to fostering musical talent and contributing to international cultural exchange.

Dr. Zhang's musical journey has taken him around the world, with solo recitals, chamber music concerts, and concerto performances throughout China, the United States, and Europe. Notable venues include the China National Centre for the Performing Arts, the Forbidden City Concert Hall, the National Library of China Concert Hall, the Rialto Center for the Arts in Atlanta, and the DiMenna Center for Classical Music in New York City. Zhang has premiered compositions by contemporary composers, including Xin Huguang, Xue Jin, and Julian Cochran, showcasing his dedication to expanding the repertoire of modern piano music. His playing has been praised as "Mr. Zhang has excellent technique and is a very probing musician..." "Shichao's performances reflect a great musicality, depth of interpretation, and technical expertise..."

A graduate of the Eastman School of Music, Dr. Zhang earned his Doctor of Musical Arts in Piano Performance and Literature with a minor in Chamber Music and Accompanying. His dedication to teaching and performing was recognized with the Eastman Teaching Assistant Prize in 2013-2014 and induction into the Pi Kappa Lambda National Music Honor Society. Originally from China, Zhang received his early training in Beijing under Madam Yafen Zhu and Ms. Chen Zhang.



## Miracle Amah, Soprano

A native of Nigeria, soprano Miracle Amah is known for the lyricism and beauty of her voice and her compelling presence on stage. Presently based in Central Illinois, she performs various genres of music which includes opera, art songs, oratorios, popular music, contemporary music, negro spirituals, and jazz. Amah has played major roles in opera productions, and her staged performances include recitals, masterclasses, scenes and full opera productions in Nigeria, Canada, Russia, Germany, Dubai and the United States.

Amah maintains a professional singing career as she writes lyrics and premiers new compositions by Nigerian and African composers. Appended to her credentials are a doctoral degree in Vocal Performance, Pedagogy and Literature from James Madison University Master's degree in Opera and Vocal performance from the Longy School of Music, Cambridge, Massachusetts, Associate board of the royal school of music (ABRSM) Licentiate in vocal performance (LRSM); which is a Bachelor of Music in vocal performance.

Miracle has given lectures and masterclasses at colleges, institutions, schools and churches, including the Mountain Top Conservatory of Music – where she was Assistant Professor teaching vocal techniques. She has given recitals featuring Nigerian music highlighting several languages and genres.



# Lauren Bolla, Mezzo Soprano

Lauren Bolla is a mezzo soprano originally from Chesterton, IN. She is currently pursuing studies in Vocal Performance at Indiana University under the tutelage of Peter Volpe. She has performed many roles spanning opera and musical theatre, including Marcellina (*Le Nozze di Figaro*), Beggar Woman (*Sweeney Todd*), and La Zelatrice (*Suor Angelica*). She also performed in the chorus of the world premiere of The Amazing Adventures of Kavalier and Clay, in collaboration with the Metropolitan Opera. Bolla has

performed scenes as Jo March (Little Women), Orfeo (Orfeo ed Euridice), and Miss Todd (The Old Maid and the Thief). She is the 2025 second prize winner of the Indianapolis Matinee Musicale competition. An avid lover of song, Bolla has sung lieder in Graz, Austria with AIMS in 2024. In Graz, she also had the opportunity to sing excerpts from Handel's Messiah in the Graz Cathedral. Bolla is currently an alto choral scholar at Trinity Episcopal Church in Bloomington, Indiana.



#### Thomas Studebaker, Tenor

Thomas Studebaker has established himself as a powerful Heldentenor, having appeared with many of the world's leading orchestras and opera companies since 1995.

Highlights of Mr. Studebaker's orchestral engagements include Beethoven's Symphony No. 9 with both the London Philharmonic Orchestra and New York Philharmonic with conductor Kurt Masur, the WDR Orchestra in Cologne under Semyon Bychkov, the New York Philharmonic with Lorin Maazel, the Netherlands Radio Philharmonic at the Concertgebouw in Amsterdam with Edo de Waart, as well as with the St. Paul Chamber Orchestra,

the Pittsburgh Symphony, the Atlanta Symphony Orchestra, Sydney Symphony, and the Israel Philharmonic. He has sung Waldemar in Schönberg's Gurrelieder with the Nagoya Philharmonic, the Tokyo Symphony and the American Symphony Orchestra at the Bard Festival, Beethoven's Missa Solemnis with the London Philharmonic and Kurt Masur, and Max Bruch's Moses with the Netherlands Radio Philharmonic Orchestra.

Mr. Studebaker made his debut as Siegmund in Die Walküre at New Orleans Opera and has since repeated the role at Lyric Opera of Chicago and at the famed Teatro Colón in Buenos Aires under the direction of Charles Dutoit. His distinguished international opera career has spanned the United States and three continents.





#### Peter Volpe, Bass

is professor of music in voice at the Indiana University Jacobs School of Music. Praised for his "stentorian and robust bass" by The New York Times, American bass Volpe continually receives critical and popular acclaim across four continents for his powerful command and rich texture of his timbre. He has performed at leading opera houses, including the Metropolitan Opera, Washington National Opera, Lyric Opera of Chicago, and San Francisco Opera, among many others.

Possessing a vast repertoire of over 90 roles in six languages in a career spanning more than 35 years, his captivating style

and interpretive skills embrace the depth of every historical and fictional character he embodies. Of his portrayal of Prince Gremin in Eugene Onegin, Opera News applauded his ability "to create in his single aria and scene an impressive dignity. His full-bodied bass and great candor of tone, together with his intelligent interpretation, won him a well-deserved ovation."

Volpe has performed with some of the most celebrated conductors of his time, including James Levine, Seiji Ozawa, Valery Gergiev, Sir John Pritchard, Maurizio Arena, Marco Armilliato, Marcello Viotti, Jacques Lacombe, Jonathan Darlington, Semyon Bychkov, Joseph Rescigno, Vincent La Selva, Richard Buckley, Leon Botstein, and Richard Hickox, among others.

#### **Usher Staff**

Ushers are located at the entrance of the venue. If you have a question or a problem, please let them know and they will contact the House Manager.

#### **Ticket Policies**

Please note that all ticket sales are final, and refunds will not be given.

#### **Late Arrival**

During classical concerts, late seating will only take place during the first convenient pause in the program.

During jazz, folk, world, or pop concerts, late seating is more casual, but ushers may ask you to wait to be seated between pieces. Please check with an usher regarding when you may enter the venue.

#### Mobile Devices, Photography and Recording

Please turn off all light-illuminating or sound-emitting devices. Mobile phone use is strictly prohibited inside all venues. Text-messaging and the taking of photographs or videos by phone are not permitted.

The use of cameras - with or without flash - and recording devices is a violation of copyright law and discourteous to other audience members.

Failure to comply will result in being asked to leave the performance without a refund.

#### **Doctor and Parent Emergency Calls**

If you are a medical professional/parent with a sitter at home, please put you phone on silent and wait to take the call until you are out of the performance venue.

#### No Smoking

Eastern Illinois University is a tobacco-free campus. Smoking of any kind, including electronic cigarettes, is prohibited on all university property.

#### **Food and Beverages**

Food is not allowed inside any of the venues. Only beverages in the special Doudna drink cup, with a secured lid, are permitted in the venues.
