To the Hon^l Mayor and Common Council of the City of Chicago

Your Petitioner, would respectfully ask of your Hon¹ Body, to be released from the payment of a certain Fine, imposed upon him in November last

The particulers, of which is as follows, That during the excitement of the arrest of the Fugitive Slave, last Fall. your Petitioner, was in the Street, looking on at the confusion of the crowd, the Same as many others. And while so Standing, quietly and peacable, He was ordered by the City Marshall, and an officer of the Police. To assist in arresting a certain noisy, unruly person, who was trying, to excite the crowd to Violence, I obeyed the order of the officers, and did assist in taking this person to the Watch House, And for so doing, I was complain--ed of, and Suit brought against me, by the person so arrested, and by an array of witnesses, who Swore direct false, to the facts of the case. I was fined \$12,50 and costs, which fine, your Petitioner would respectfully Say, He is utterly unable to pay, as the compensation for his daily Labor, is barely Sufficient now to Support himself and family, and Knowing no Honorable way, he can pay the fine,

He very respectfully asks of your Honorable Body, to be released from the payment thereof

And your Petitioner will ever pray.
