APLIA HOMEWORK

Cengage Aplia assignments are on a hard deadline each week. The normal deadline <u>is</u> <u>Monday night</u> as per the calendar on the Cengage Mindtap site. All specific deadlines for all assignments are posted on Cengage Mindtap site on the first day of class.

What happens if you miss a deadline?

If you miss the deadline, the server will not accept your answers and your grade will be a zero. It is imperative that you start early and save your work day by day. Submit assignments through the week. If you regularly wait until Monday (or Sunday) deadline to do your homework, you will miss deadlines and this will negatively affect your grade quickly.

Can I get an extension? Extensions are only granted if there is a problem that effects the whole class: i.e. problems with the Cengage website. Technical problems such as no Wi-Fi access, browser or cookie issues that don't allow you to submit answers, or simply running out of time, do not merit an extension.

What can I do if I miss a deadline?

Free Passes

Every student has TEN FREE PASSES for missed online assignments or assignments that you wish to redo for a better grade. A free pass covers one section, for example. 3.2 or 1.1. In order to request a free pass please include which pass, which section and missed date, i.e. Pass#3 section 3.1 2/15. Once the pass is requested, the grades will be reset (this cannot be undone!) and the due date will be extended. You have two weeks to complete the section after you request a free pass.

Free passes at the end of the Semester: Deadline for completing all requested free pass extensions is the first day of finals week before 11pm.

All free pass assignments must be finished (not requested) by December 4th. For example, if you request a free pass, say December 2nd, you will only have two days, until Dec. 4th to complete the work.

Note: free passes are not an automatic A, free passes are a deadline extension to complete the work.

Extra Credit

(Yes, this policy below is complicated to read, I'll explain it as we go)

If you do a non-aplia "exercise" set within a section, you will receive a 10% boost to your aplia grade in that section. Chapter 9-14 extra credit exercises are at the end of the chapter and can be used to add 10% to any aplia section in that chapter. A couple of conditions: you must complete that exercises with a 90% or higher. Any non-aplia exercises lower with less than 90% do not count either for or against your grade. Thee last day for any extra credit is the first day of finals week at 11pm (CST).

Unfortunately, due to tech setup, extra credit does not appear as extra credit! Please be assured if you do not do the extra credit assignments, they will be taken out of your grade at the end of the term. If you do them, any points you earn will be credited to your grade. You will not be penalized for missed questions on extra credit assignments.

You can do extra credit at any time for any section up to the deadline. Deadline for completing all extra credit is the first day of finals week at 11pm(CST).
