# GET TO KNOW...

### Welcome DJ Fox, He/Him/His

Growing up, DJ Fox was mentored by a very special higher education professional – his mom. Teri worked in higher education registration for 35 years, serving as the Registrar for Northwest Missouri State University and the University of Central Missouri. By observing and listening to his mom, DJ learned about the opportunities of those who work in higher education to positively impact the lives of students. These opportunities to make a difference were foremost on DJ's mind when he joined the EIU family as Director of the Martin Luther King, Jr. University Union on June 6.

Although DJ grew up aware of careers in higher education, he did not always envision himself following in his mom's professional footsteps. DJ majored in digital media production at the University of Central Missouri, with dreams of working in radio and television production. While an undergraduate, DJ was unaware that his on-campus jobs would do far more than help him pay the bills; those jobs laid the foundation for his future career. As a sophomore, DJ worked at the information desk in Central Missouri's Union, serving as the "first impression of the Union" for many. He set a positive tone, guided people to their destinations, and served as the dispatcher for all radio calls in the building. As a junior, he assisted the Union's event technology department. As a senior, he served as a building supervisor, overseeing the building during evening and weekend hours, supervising other student workers, communicating with offices in the Union, serving as an event liaison, assisting with room set-ups, and helping solve technology challenges. It was then that DJ began to "see the pieces connect"; he slowly began to realize that the skills he was learning in the classroom to prepare for a career in radio and television production were also applicable to the work he was doing in the Union. After graduating and working at a radio station for a couple months, DJ decided his greatest enthusiasm lie in higher education. He returned to the University of Central Missouri to pursue a graduate degree in college student personnel administration and rejoined the Union as a graduate assistant.

DJ began his full-time professional career as the Assistant Director of the Memorial Union at Fort Hays State University and then served as Assistant Director of Facilities and Operations at the Plaster Student Union at Missouri State University. As he joins EIU, DJ says he hopes to help our University Union become "the Cheesecake Factory of the EIU campus." DJ explained, "When you open the menu, there are too many amazing things to choose from!" In his work to do

that, DJ will remember the example set by his mom, doing what is best for students and his team.
