

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GET TO KNOW...

She holds University Police Department shield #175, she has an official name badge with her photo on it, and she is listed on the UPD website "Meet the Police Staff." She is Ms. Penny, UPD's newest officer and Coles County's first Law Enforcement Therapy Dog. Officer Penny (or Miss Penny if you wish) is a one-year-old Foxhound/Beagle dog finishing her training with Chief Marisol Gamboa.

Penny is a Tier Three therapy dog and a graduate of Paws and Stripes College at Eastern Florida State College, the only nationally recognized law enforcement therapy dog college. After Penny was rescued from a shelter, she was trained by female inmates from the Brevard County, FL jail, along with students from Eastern Florida State Veterinary Technology Program. Penny is a multi-discipline therapy dog able to provide individual comfort as well as accompany Chief Gamboa during EIU/community events. Penny is not a service dog, as she is trained to be able to interact with a wide variety of people.



A therapy dog is identified as a dog used to provide emotional support to an individual, or individuals, in a variety of settings with a goal of providing a soothing, comforting interaction. Therapy dog teams can neutralize negative perceptions of law enforcement and help to bridge the gap between police and community.

You may have already seen Penny and Chief Gamboa on campus interacting with students, staff, faculty, and summer campers. Penny made her first official appearance this past Friday during the June Board of Trustees meeting.
